Executive Summary:

The President of the United States and the County of Sonoma issue annual proclamations designating September as National Preparedness Month.

National Preparedness Month (NPM) was created by the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Ready campaign in response to the tragic events of September 11 in order to educate the public on how to prepare for emergencies. This year's NPM campaign focuses on the theme: Don't Wait. Communicate. Make Your Emergency Plan Today. This year we are asking individuals to take action now – make a plan with your community, your family, and for your pets. Plan how to stay safe and communicate during the disasters that can affect all residents of Sonoma County. We ask everyone to participate in America's National PrepareAthon!, which culminates National Preparedness Month on September 30. The PrepareAthon! is a grassroots campaign for action to increase community preparedness and resilience during times of emergency. It calls on individuals and organizations to increase understanding of disasters that affect them, take action to increase their preparedness, and participate in community resilience planning. Further information can be found at www.community.fema.gov.

The Fire and Emergency Services Department (FES) has taken several steps to better prepare Sonoma County to respond to a disaster. Most of our improvements in readiness and capability are tied to an after action review identifying lessons learned from actual responses such as the South Napa Earthquake, December 2014 Flood, or functional EOC exercises like the regional Urban Shield Yellow Command exercise. Over the past year, FES has hosted numerous workshops, trainings on the Logistics Section Database, Web EOC, EOC Orientation, Legal Officer in the EOC, volunteer management and coordination, 'Cold Blue' cold weather response plan, a two-day Receive, Stage & Store (RSS) Warehouse full scale exercise, and, in conjunction with the Naval War College and the City of Santa Rosa, hosted an international group of military officers from over 50 countries on emergency management and response. We also participated in regional workshops and exercises related to information and sharing, medical health, critical infrastructure, points of distribution, oil spill response, drought, and catastrophic earthquake to further collaborate with our Bay Area neighbors as it relates to our emergency management response capability.

In addition, we made significant strides in preparing for tsunami. Coordinating with Regional Parks, Transportation & Public Works, California Geological Survey, Cal OES, CHP, State Parks and Cal Trans, we have installed over 150 tsunami warning and evacuation signs on our coastline. To raise the tsunami hazard awareness, we conducted a notification exercise for those residents living in the hazard area and completed the first ever flyover of our beaches utilizing a Civil Air Patrol airborne public address in March. The following month, we staffed a popular tsunami hazard information booth at the Bodega Fisherman's Festival.

FES has continued to coordinate and expand our emergency management capability and response. The Sonoma County Operational Area Emergency Council and your Board approved the December 2014 revision of the Emergency Operations Plan and the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) Staff Development Plan. We have identified key personnel to staff the EOC and send a monthly email providing updates about the EOC and training opportunities. A new EOC facilities management and status tool has been developed to assist with tracking and publicizing key resources, such as potential shelter and points of distribution locations in the Operational Area. Identifying potential weaknesses in security resulted in completing a physical hardening of the EOC entryway and developing procedures to ensure security. A functional EOC exercise is planned for Friday, September 11 to practice logistical, public information, cold weather notification, and alternative communication capabilities as part of the regional Urban Shield training and exercise program.

FES encourages the residents of Sonoma County to take concrete action toward preparing for emergencies and disasters during National Preparedness Month and to continue the effort throughout the year. For free information on how to prepare for all emergencies, individuals can visit the *Ready* websites at <u>Ready.gov</u> or <u>Listo.gov</u> (*en Español*). These activities, along with a vigilant public, contribute to an overall level of preparedness that is critical to the safety of our county, state and country.

FES also encourages everyone in the County to participate in the Great ShakeOut Earthquake Drills which are held on October 15, 2015. The public may register and get great ideas on how to be prepared for an earthquake at www.shakeout.org/california.

Sonoma County gives tribute to the many sacrifices made on September 11, 2001, and the War on Terrorism that followed, with a moment to remember those who lost their lives, proclaiming the month of September as National Preparedness Month.

Executive Summary:

Board of Directors, Sonoma County Water Agency

This Agenda item will allow the Board to consider granting a 45,929 square foot permanent easement to the County of Sonoma Department of Transportation and Public Works (Public Works) for construction and upgrade of the Wohler Bridge. This item was considered by the Board of Directors at the August 25, 2015 Board meeting.

HISTORY OF ITEM/BACKGROUND:

Public Works proposes to seismically retrofit the historic Wohler Road Bridge over the Russian River (Project). This item would grant a right-of-way acquisition to Public Works from the Water Agency to allow the project construction to proceed in 2016.

Wohler Road connects the Forestville area to Westside Road and the Healdsburg area to the north. The bridge is located approximately 1.5 miles north of River Road. It consists of one-lane and was built in 1921. The County of Sonoma (County) appears to only have prescriptive control of the historic right-of-way containing the bridge and road improvements at this location. The proposed permanent easement acquisition will provide the County with clear title to this right-of-way, including areas beyond the historic use of the real property upon which the bridge and its appurtenances are located, that are required to enlarge two of the bridge footings for the Project.

The Water Agency owns a fee title interest in the real property over which the bridge passes. The bridge is located approximately 2,600 feet upstream of the Water Agency's Mirabel diversion facilities within an area where the Water Agency impounds river flows for diversion (commonly referred to as the Mirabel-Wohler area backwater). In addition to the backwater function of this real property, the Water Agency also operates a number of critical components of its water diversion and transmission facilities beneath the bridge.

From October 1 to May 15, of each year, the Sonoma County Regional Parks Department operates the Wohler Bridge Fishing Access facility at the west end of the bridge that is located on the real property owned by the Water Agency through agreement with the Water Agency. The facility includes a paved parking area, picnic tables, and a key-access launch ramp that provides for the loading and off-loading of small watercraft.

The Wohler Road Bridge is structurally inadequate to withstand a large earthquake event. A seismic retrofit is needed to meet current American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) Design Criteria as amended by Caltrans Seismic Design Criteria, to strengthen the bridge to withstand earthquake shaking and prevent it from collapsing during an earthquake. The proposed retrofit of the existing bridge includes replacement of the existing bridge bearings with seismic isolation bearings, abutment and foundation retrofit, pier retrofit (including enlargement of four of the concrete pier footings), expansion joint retrofit and deck replacement. Construction of the retrofit will require temporary vegetation removal and a temporary work pad in the Russian River. After the proposed seismic retrofit, some structural damage may occur during large seismic events, but the bridge would not be expected to collapse. The Board of Supervisors approved a project to seismically retrofit the Wohler Road Bridge on November 24, 2014.

General storage of equipment, materials, and worker vehicle parking will occur at the paved parking lot facility located at the west end of the bridge and at a large compacted dirt and grass clearing located just to the north of Pier 3. Various temporary access roads and pads will be installed to access pier footings and to provide temporary bridge supports. A causeway and work pad may need to be installed in a flooded area if the Water Agency's rubber dam is in place when retrofit work on Pier 4 is performed.

In order to accommodate the project improvements and construction activities, a 45,929 square foot permanent easement is required from the Water Agency, including access extending along the public river access road and parking lot. The Water Agency will also need to grant the County's eventual construction contractor a revocable license to perform the necessary work within a temporary work area. The Water Agency staff has negotiated an easement agreement with Public Works that will ensure that the operations and facilities of the Water Agency will not be adversely affected in any way by Public Works' retrofit and operation of the Wohler Bridge. Water Agency staff recommends that the Board of Directors waive compensation and approve the conveyance of the right-of-way required for this project for no consideration.

CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT COMPLIANCE

The County has completed environmental documentation in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act for the Project. The County prepared an Initial Study and filed a Negative Declaration for the Project. The County adopted the Negative Declaration on November 2, 2014. The easement also has met all the requirements of Government Code, Section 65402, for General Plan consistency.

The Water Agency has prepared a Notice of Determination in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act, the State California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines and the Water Agency's Procedures for the Implementation of the California Environmental Quality Act. The Notice of Determination states that based on the findings of the Initial Study and the Negative Declaration prepared by the County, the execution of the easement agreement would not have a significant adverse impact on the environment.

County of Sonoma, Board of Supervisors

Staff of Public Works recommends the Board of Supervisors authorizes the Chair to execute the Easement Agreement with the Sonoma County Water Agency.

Executive Summary:

HISTORY OF ITEM/BACKGROUND

The Wohler electrical substation is the critical electrical infrastructure that serves as the distribution point for electricity to the collector wells at the Water Agency's Russian River water production facilities. Testing, inspection, scheduled maintenance, planned parts replacement, and pre-existing arrangements for emergency repairs when needed, are integral to effective management and reliability of substation facilities. Equipment to be serviced includes transformers, circuit breakers, circuit switchers, switchgear, incoming power structure, insulators, grounding systems, meters, and protective relays. Electrical substation work is highly specialized and requires a great deal of expertise, therefore the Water Agency needs to engage a service provider to conduct this work.

SELECTION PROCESS

On October 10, 2013, the Water Agency issued a Request for Qualifications to four firms. The three firms listed below submitted Statements of Qualifications:

- 1) HART High-Voltage Apparatus Repair and Testing Company, Yuba City, CA
- 2) Industrial Tests, Inc., Rocklin, CA
- 3) Pacific Gas and Electric Company, Business Development, San Francisco, CA

Pacific Gas and Electric Company was originally selected. However, during negotiations the parties were unable to arrive at mutually agreeable project terms and emergency response times. HART High-Voltage Apparatus Repair and Testing Company (Consultant) was then selected as it is the next best

qualified firm. Consultant has previously provided similar services to the Water Agency. It is able to respond in a timely manner during emergencies, has a large parts inventory for the brand of substation equipment the Water Agency uses, and has no objections to the business terms of the Water Agency's standard agreement.

SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED

Under the proposed agreement, Consultant will conduct electrical testing, inspection, maintenance and emergency repair on the Wohler electrical substation for the Water Agency's Russian River water production facilities. This includes an expanded scope of service from the previous agreement with Consultant.

The cost of services will not exceed \$140,000; the term end date is December 31, 2018.

Prior Board Actions:

05/04/2010: Approved agreement between Water Agency and Hart High Voltage Apparatus Repair and Testing Company for electrical substation testing, inspection, maintenance, and emergency repair. Cost \$90,000 over a three year term.

Providing maintenance of the electrical infrastructure at the county's water production facilities will help insure long term reliability of the water delivery system.

Executive Summary:

This item requests authority for the Chair to execute an agreement with Environmental Science Associates, Inc., (Consultant) to provide engineering services related to the City Watersheds of Sonoma Valley Project (Project). This Project is a phased project within the Nathanson Creek/Fryer Creek subwatersheds of Sonoma Valley. The Project represents an initial implementation element of broader efforts by the Sonoma County Water Agency (Water Agency) to identify and implement multi-benefit, multi-partner watershed projects, the core objectives of which are to provide flood hazard reduction and groundwater recharge.

Phase 1 of the Project focuses on the Fryer Creek subwatershed, and Phase 2 will focus on the Nathanson Creek subwatershed. The proposed consultant services will refine and evaluate alternative project elements being proposed for Phase 1 and include preliminary design, hydraulic modeling, and stakeholder/public outreach support services. Phase 1 is eligible for grant reimbursement through a \$1.89 million Proposition 1E grant which the California Department of Water Resources awarded for the Phase 1 project on September 20, 2013.

HISTORY OF ITEM/BACKGROUND:

In 2012, the Water Agency completed scoping studies in three of the watersheds in which the Water Agency conducts the majority of its flood control operations (Laguna-Mark West, Petaluma River, and Sonoma Creek watersheds). The goal of the scoping studies was to identify opportunities within these watersheds to implement integrated, multi-benefit projects that could: 1) address multiple watershed objectives, 2) align with the Water Agency's Water Supply Strategies Action Plan in regard to combined

water supply and flood control projects, and 3) be developed to be highly eligible for various grant funding opportunities.

The scoping studies were conducted by separate consultant teams - under Water Agency guidance - for each of the three watersheds. The studies identified core and supporting objectives, opportunities and constraints, types of project concepts most likely to achieve the objectives, and generalized locations or regions where implementation is anticipated to be most effective or feasible within each watershed.

Based on the results of the studies, the combined Nathanson/Fryer Creek subwatershed within the Sonoma Creek Watershed was collectively identified as one of the two highest priority subwatersheds in which to pursue implementation of a multi-benefit project for two primary reasons: 1) the combined Nathanson/Fryer Creek subwatershed has the greatest potential to reduce flood damages in the urbanized area, and 2) stormwater recharge can benefit the groundwater in an area that is susceptible to declining groundwater levels and increased saline intrusion from San Pablo Bay.

Water Agency staff collaborated with several partner entities in the Sonoma Creek Watershed to develop project concepts for Sonoma Valley and, more specifically, to identify projects for inclusion into the 2012 update of the Bay Area Integrated Water Management Plan and eligibility for Round 2 Proposition 84 and 1E funding opportunities. The collaborating entities included the City of Sonoma, Sonoma Ecology Center, Southern Sonoma County Resource Conservation District (now Sonoma Resource Conservation District), and Sonoma County Agricultural Preservation and Open Space District. Also, outreach to the Sonoma Valley Groundwater Management Basin Advisory Panel was conducted as part of the scoping study. This effort resulted in identification of two programmatic projects: one watershed-wide project concept for Sonoma Valley and one project specific to the combined Nathanson/Fryer Creek subwatersheds. The Nathanson/Fryer Creek project has been identified as the City Watersheds of Sonoma Valley Project and split into two phases. Phase 1 focuses on the Fryer Creek subwatershed and Phase 2 will focus on the Nathanson Creek subwatershed.

In January 2013, the Water Agency submitted a grant application for Phase 1 that focused predominantly on the Fryer Creek subwatershed. Phase 1 originally included the development of a citywide drainage master plan within the City of Sonoma, habitat restoration and sediment removal on various reaches of Fryer Creek, Fryer Creek culvert replacement or modification at MacArthur Street, storm drain improvements on First Street West, and a stormwater detention/groundwater recharge project, public access trails, and interpretive elements within the Montini Preserve area. Due to lower than anticipated groundwater infiltration capacity at the Montini site and local opposition, the proposed project has been modified significantly to eliminate the detention/recharge element at the Montini site and the MacArthur Street culvert replacement. The modified Project alternatives now being evaluated propose to expand the storm drain improvements along First Street West, where significant flooding occurs and threatens residential and business properties in the downtown Plaza area. The revised Project includes two options to improve deficiencies in the First Street West storm drain infrastructure: 1) a 3 acre-foot subsurface stormwater detention facility combined with completion of the 54-inch storm-drain pipe, or 2) a 6 acre-foot subsurface stormwater detention facility and minor improvements in the First Street West storm drain line. Pending verification of feasibility, the detention storage is tentatively planned beneath parking areas at the Sonoma Valley Veterans Memorial Center, based on preliminary concept discussions with the General Services Department. The Project will provide flood

protection, ecosystem function, water quality, public safety, and educational benefits.

Specific elements of a Phase 2 project are still being developed and are anticipated to be evaluated further as part of a future feasibility study under a separate agreement to be brought to the Board.

The grant request, authorized by the Board in January 2013, for the Phase 1 project sought up to \$2 million in Flood Prevention Bond Act of 2006 (Prop 1E) funding, with a comparable commitment of local match funds or in-kind support. The Water Agency has since received notice of final grant award in the amount of \$1.89 million announced by the Department of Water Resources. The Department of Water Resources, the funding agency for this grant, has indicated to staff that it is willing to allow the awarded grant funds to apply to the modified First Street West project pending determination that the modified project alternatives can provide comparable flood reduction benefits as the original project concept. The proposed agreement with Consultant will provide for the engineering analysis necessary to verify the flood benefits and support additional public outreach efforts associated with the modified Project concept.

SELECTION PROCESS

At the initiation of the watershed scoping studies in 2010, the Water Agency issued a Request for Qualifications to 32 firms. The following eight firms submitted Statements of Qualifications:

- 1. Arcadis, San Francisco, CA
- ESA PWA (Environmental Science Associates), San Francisco, CA
- 3. Prunuske Chatham, Inc., Sebastopol, CA
- 4. RMC Water and Environment, San Francisco, CA
- Stetson Engineers, Inc., San Rafael, CA
- 6. West Consultants, Inc., San Diego, CA
- 7. West Yost Associates, Santa Rosa, CA
- 8. Winzler & Kelly, Santa Rosa, CA

The following three firms were selected to conduct the work, one for each of the watersheds listed:

- 1. Laguna-Mark West Watershed: Winzler and Kelly, Santa Rosa, CA
- 2. Petaluma River Watershed: RMC Water and Environment, San Francisco, CA
- 3. Sonoma Creek Watershed: ESA PWA (Environmental Science Associates), San Francisco, CA

The above firms were selected to perform the planning, design, and implementation support work based on their demonstrated qualifications, the strengths and the technical expertise of their respective teams, and familiarity and experience with the issues and stakeholders specific to the individual watersheds.

Multiple phases of study and design were anticipated at the time of selection, and maintaining continuity of consultants through those phases is desirable and beneficial for efficiently managing watershed-specific issues, public and stakeholder concerns, and minimizing costs associated with watershed-specific familiarity and experience provided by the selected consultants.

The Consultant is an engineering firm with experience in watershed planning, hydrologic, and

hydrogeologic analysis and design.

SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED

Under the proposed agreement, Consultant will refine conceptual designs and analyses performed by Water Agency staff and analyze the flood benefits using a system-wide City of Sonoma Storm Drain Master Plan hydrologic model. Flood benefits will be estimated from model results and compared with benefits proposed in the Grant application. Consultant will also prepare preliminary concept design exhibits for the revised Project, and provide technical support and participation for the Project team, public outreach, and City Council meeting.

The proposed engineering services do not include detailed design or preparation of construction contract documents. Following completion of the site investigations, Water Agency staff will bring a separate item to the Board for an agreement to provide those additional services for the Project.

The cost of services will not exceed \$61,512; the term end date is August 31, 2016.

Cost \$364,000; term end December 31, 2015; authorize the General Manager to execute License Agreements with property owners in an amount not to exceed \$4,000, to allow for geotechnical and hydrogeologic investigations.

- a) Authorize the General Manager to execute a cost-sharing agreement in the amount of \$32,494 with Association of Bay Area Governments to fund a regional grant application to Department of Water Resources for \$41,305,435 in grant funds; agreement terminates upon notice from Association of Bay Area Governments that the Grant Opportunity is no longer available or upon the execution of the Grant Agreement, whichever is earlier.
- b) Authorize the General Manager to amend the agreement provided amendments do not cumulatively increase the total cost to the Water Agency by more than \$8,100 and do not substantially change the scope of work, to make other modifications consistent with standard Water Agency professional service agreements, and to terminate the cost sharing agreement (per standard protocol) under the provisions provided in the agreement.

Executive Summary:

This item requests Board authorization to participate in an agreement (Cost Share Agreement) with Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) to share the costs of preparing a regional grant application to the Proposition 84 2015 Implementation Grant Program among the Sonoma County Water Agency (Water Agency) and seven other Bay Area Integrated Regional Water Management agencies. The Water Agency's cost share is \$32,494 out of a total cost of \$150,000, and the term of the agreement will not exceed 18 months. The application is for \$41 million in funds available to the San Francisco Bay Area Region, and includes \$19,000,000 funding for the San Francisco Bay Area Advanced Quantitative Precipitation Information System Project. This item also requests authority for the General Manager to amend the agreement if necessary by no more than \$8,100. The Cost Sharing Agreement terminates upon notice and provision of supporting documentation from ABAG is no longer available, or upon the execution of the Grant Agreement, whichever is earlier.

HISTORY OF ITEM/BACKGROUND

State voters have approved multiple statewide bond measures since 2000 to fund water and natural resource projects and programs, including Integrated Regional Water Management planning and implementation. The goal of Integrated Regional Water Management planning and implementation efforts is to manage water resources in a collaborative way and to have regions work across jurisdictional, watershed, and political boundaries.

The Proposition 84 Chapter 2 Integrated Regional Water Management Grant Program (Grant Program), administered by the California Department of Water Resources, provides funding for projects that assist local public agencies to meet long term water needs of the state, including the delivery of safe drinking water and the protection of water quality and the environment. The Grant Program is designed to encourage integrated regional strategies for management of water resources and to provide funding for implementation projects that support integrated water management. Grant applications are submitted by an agency or entity on behalf of an Integrated Regional Water Management region.

The 2015 Implementation Round of the Grant Program will award the remaining \$231 million of Proposition 84 bond funds. Of that amount, the San Francisco Bay Area Region will be awarded \$41,305,435.

San Francisco Bay Area Advanced Quantitative Precipitation Information System Project

For more than two years, the Water Agency and several other agencies in the Bay Area Region have collaborated with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to develop a regional project called the "San Francisco Bay Area Advanced Quantitative Precipitation Information System (System)." Its goal is to provide early notification of more precise rainfall location, intensity and amounts for the improved management of water supply reservoirs, the improved operations of combined sewer and wastewater systems, the improved operations of flood protection facilities, and a myriad of other benefits to transportation and emergency response agencies. Because the System will be on the cutting edge of precipitation forecast technology and methodology, the scope and details of the System are still being refined. Grant funds, if awarded, will be used in part to hone the details of the Advanced Quantitative Precipitation Information project.

This Advanced Quantitative Precipitation Information project was one of six projects selected by the agencies participating in the Bay Area Integrated Regional Water Management process to be a part of the San Francisco Bay Area's proposal for the 2015 round of Proposition 84 Implementation Grant Program. Of the \$41,305,435 in grant funds available to the San Francisco Bay Area Region under this round of funding, the San Francisco Bay Area Region agencies have elected to dedicate more that 60% of the potentially-available grant funds to the Advanced Quantitative Precipitation Information project.

2015 Implementation Grant Application Process

The San Francisco Bay Area Region has selected ABAG to act as lead agency on the 2015 grant application. ABAG's responsibilities will include acting as agency of record and contracting principal for the procurement, selection, retention and payment of the grant consultant for the Cost Share Agreement; fiscal agency for all activities proposed under the Cost Share Agreement; party responsible that grant application is submitted on time; and recipient of the grant, if awarded by the Department of Water Resources.

Cost Share Agreement

The purpose of the Cost Share Agreement is to fund ABAG's retention of a grant consultant to prepare the Bay Area Region's Proposition 84 Integrated Regional Water Management Implementation Grant Proposal. The Cost Share Agreement defines the duties and obligations of the parties and establishes the process for preparation and submission of the grant application.

Parties participating in the Cost Sharing arrangement are ABAG, City of East Palo Alto, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, Marin Municipal Water District, San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, San Mateo County Resource Conservation District, Santa Clara Valley Water District, Sonoma County Water Agency, and State Coastal Commission.

Collectively, the parties will contribute \$150,000 to fund the Cost Share Agreement. Individual shares, called Deposits, are allocated based upon the estimated grant preparation costs for individual projects. The Water Agency's Deposit share is \$32,494. If costs for preparing the grant application exceed the Deposit allocations, the Cost Share Agreement includes a provision to increase each party's cost share using the same ratio that determined Deposit amounts. For this reason, staff requests amendment authority for the General Manager in an amount not to exceed \$8,100, which is approximately 25% of the Deposit amount. (Last year, costs for preparing the application for the Bay Area Region's 2014 Drought Round grant program were below the estimated costs, and parties received refunds.)

ABAG has selected Horizon Water and Environment, LLC, as grant consultant to prepare the Bay Area Region's Proposition 84 Integrated Regional Water Management Implementation grant application. ABAG will execute a separate contract with Horizon to perform those services.

Applications to the 2015 Integrated Regional Water Management Grant Program was submitted for the August 7, 2015 deadline. The Bay Area Region expects that draft recommendations for funding will be announced by late Fall 2015. This would be followed by a public comment period before final awards are made.

REQUEST FOR WATER AGENCY GENERAL MANAGER AUTHORITIES

The standard template used for professional services agreements includes the following language, "Minor changes, which do not increase the amount paid under the Agreement, and which do not significantly change the scope of work or significantly lengthen time schedules may be executed by the Water Agency's General Manager in a form approved by County Counsel." Since the subject agreement was prepared by the ABAG using its form, this language is not included. Therefore, staff requests that the Water Agency's General Manager is authorized to amend the Agreement, if appropriate, in keeping with standard protocol.

Also, the standard template used for professional services agreements includes the following language, "Authority to Terminate: Water Agency's right to terminate may be exercised by Water Agency's General Manager." Since the subject agreement was prepared by the ABAG using its form, this language is not included. Therefore, staff requests that the Water Agency's General Manager be authorized to terminate the Agreement, if appropriate, in keeping with standard protocol.

Executive Summary:

This item requests approval of a contract with Siri Grading and Paving, Inc. for \$277,700 for construction of Service Center Parking Lot, Phase II (800 Aviation Boulevard).

PROJECT BACKGROUND:

The Service Center Parking Lot Phase II Project consists of construction of a new parking area at the Service Center facility located at 800 Aviation Boulevard, Santa Rosa, California, outside the limits of the City of Santa Rosa. The Project includes the construction of an approximately one-acre parking lot with a lime treated subgrade, aggregate base wearing surface, area lighting and security cameras. The bidding documents contain the full description of work.

The Project was advertised for bids: June 18, 2015

Bids were opened: July 17, 2015

Bids for construction of said Project were received on July 17, 2015, as follows:

Siri Grading and Paving, Inc., Santa Rosa, CA: \$277,700 Team Ghilotti, Inc., Petaluma, CA: \$427,485

The Engineer's Estimate: \$296,000 The lowest responsive and responsible bid is from Siri Grading and Paving, Inc. and is \$18,300 below the Engineer's Estimate. Siri Grading and Paving, Inc. is experienced in this type of construction and meets the experience requirements.

Pursuant to Resolution No. 04-0547, the General Manager maintains authority to approve change orders to construction contracts approved by the Board as long as certain conditions are met. Should they occur, these change orders may necessitate minor design changes. Staff request that the Board authorize the General Manager or his designee to approve design changes as may be necessary or appropriate in connection with change orders within the General Manager's authority pursuant to Resolution No. 04-0547.

A contractor must execute a release of claims (Document 00650) before final payment but may except any unresolved claims from the release. The requested action authorizes the General Manager to approve the release unless the contractor lists unresolved claims. In that case, County Counsel must review Document 00650 prior to General Manager approval.

Upon approval on this contract, construction on the Project will begin around September 23, 2015, with an estimated completion date of December 21, 2015.

Environmental Mitigation for Service Center Parking Lot

In 2012, the Water Agency obtained a 404 Nationwide Permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) and a 401 Water Quality Certification from the North Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board (NCRWQCB) for the modification of existing drainage and the construction of the new parking lot area. The work was initially scheduled to coincide with the Service Center Relocation Project. The USACE 404 permit has expired and only a portion of the modifications to the drainage have been completed to date. Water Agency staff have submitted a renewal of the USACE 404 Nationwide Permit (NWP) for the Service Center Parking Lot Phase II Project. The Water Agency submitted the USACE 404 NWP renewal application packet on July 13, 2015. A response from USACE is anticipated before the end of August. While it is anticipated that the conditions of the permit will not change the construction contract requirements, if permit modifications do occur, a contract change order may be required to comply with the permit. Because the cost associated with this potential change order is not expected to exceed \$38,850, this change order is expected to be within the General Manager's authority pursuant to Resolution No. 04-0547.

The Water Agency recommends the Board take the following actions:

ACTIONS:

- 1. Adopt and approve the Project Manual and Drawings ("plans and specifications") entitled "Service Center Parking Lot, Phase II (800 Aviation Blvd) 0-84-7 #2."
- 2. Authorize the General Manager of the Water Agency to sign Document 00650 (Agreement and Release of Any and All Claims), with County Counsel review, if any unresolved claims are listed by the contractor.
- 3. Award the contract to Siri Grading and Paving, Inc., for the amount of \$277,700, and authorize the Chair of the Board to execute the contract.

4. Authorize the General Manager of the Water Agency or his designee to approve design changes to the Project as may be necessary or appropriate in connection with change orders within the General Manager's authority pursuant to Resolution No. 04-0547.

CEQA COMPLIANCE:

The General Manager has determined that the Airport/Larkfield/Wikiup Sanitation Zone Wastewater Treatment Facility Modifications and Construction of Fleet Services Building is exempt from CEQA pursuant to Sections 15301 (a)(b)(c): Existing Facilities; 15302 (c): Replacement or Reconstruction; 15303 (c)(d)(e): New Construction; 15304 (a)(c)(f): Minor Alterations to Land; and 15311 (a)(b): Accessory Structures. The project would consist of minor alteration of existing public facilities and replacement or reconstruction of existing utility systems and/or facilities involving negligible or no expansion of use beyond that existing at the time of the lead agency's determination. In addition, the project would include installation of small equipment, and facilities that would not exceed 10,000 square feet and utility extensions to serve such construction and accessory structures. Minor alterations to land would be limited to grading, trenching, and backfilling in existing developed and previously disturbed areas. All project work would be conducted within the footprint of the existing treatment facilities in developed and previously disturbed areas. Upon completion of construction, all surfaces would be restored and no healthy, mature, or scenic trees would be removed.

Water Agency staff has prepared a Notice of Exemption in accordance with the CEQA, the State CEQA Guidelines and the Agency's Procedures for the Implementation of CEQA as a lead agency under CEQA.

Sonoma County Board of Supervisors Response to Sonoma County Pension Reform Grand Jury Report

FINDINGS

We agree with these finding(s):

- F1: The information related to pensions is daunting and difficult for the lay person to understand.
- F2: The County, its employees, and retirees are well served by the Retirement Association.
- F3: Sonoma County, with the assistance of new State laws and good-faith bargaining with employees, has made strides towards reducing unfunded pension liabilities.
- F4: Periodic comprehensive update reports on pension reform are valuable tools for gauging the progress of reducing the unfunded liability.
- F5: A standard method of measuring performance would help citizens gauge the progress of County's goal of pension reform and funding pension liabilities.
- F6: Including annual payments toward the County's pension obligation bonds is a more accurate measurement of the financial health of the pension system.
- F7: Actuarial predictions cannot anticipate extreme market volatility, which may result in investment losses and increased unfunded liabilities.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- R1: The Office of the County Administrator publish a yearly Pension Reform Update.

 The recommendation has and will continue to be implemented.
- R2: The Office of the County Administrator continue to include the annual payment toward pension obligation bonds in its measurement of the County's ability to meet its future pension obligations.

The recommendation has and will continue to be implemented.

Sonoma County Board of Supervisors Response to Sustainable Water for Sonoma County Grand Jury Report

FINDINGS

We agree with these findings:

F1: Recent changes in California water law establish requirements for managing groundwater as a long-term sustainable resource, administered by local Groundwater Sustainability Agencies.

F2: Sonoma County is better served if Groundwater Sustainability Agencies are established in advance of state-mandated deadlines, using criteria that assure broad participation.

F5: The Sonoma County Water Agency and Sonoma County have participated significantly in preparations for sustainable water management, and can continue to contribute in the transition to management through groundwater sustainability agencies.

F6: Economic and environmental sustainability are interdependent; economic sustainability can be achieved only when critical resources such as water are also managed for sustainability.

F7: The has been no cross-discipline study of carrying capacity in Sonoma County that projects what population the water and other resources in Sonoma County are capable of supporting.

We disagree wholly or partially with these finding(s):

F3: Water agencies within Sonoma County have yet to sufficiently educate groundwater users about their responsibilities for sharing water resources, potential limitations on water use, and the advantages of making sure, through sustainability, that water will be available in the future for their own use.

We partially disagree with this finding. Both Sonoma Valley and Santa Rosa Plain groundwater basins have groundwater management plans developed under the pre-Sustainable Groundwater Management Act groundwater management planning statutory scheme (AB 3030 and SB 1938). The Water Agency is the lead agency in these efforts, working with basin advisory panels to develop and implement groundwater management plans in each basin. The basin advisory panels include representatives from agriculture, environmental groups, residential well owners, the County, cities, tribes, and community water districts. These voluntary, non-regulatory plans are an excellent first step toward groundwater sustainability, and will significantly advance the region's ability to comply with the SGMA by establishing a robust data collection and monitoring program and by

promoting, studying and implementing programs and projects aimed at sustaining the basins' groundwater resources. These existing plans also foster stakeholder coordination and public outreach, both of which are essential elements of the Act. Numerous public meetings, workshop and briefings regarding groundwater conditions and management activities have been conducted through these existing groundwater management programs. In the Petaluma Valley basin, the Water Agency and the City of Petaluma are currently engaged in a 3-year United States Geological Survey study, initiated in September 2014, to analyze groundwater use and conditions.

Using funds from a water conservation grant, the Sonoma County Water Agency is sending a flyer to all groundwater well owners in the Santa Rosa Plain notifying them of the new act and of a program that provides free water-efficient toilets and other products to well owners. Finally, a communications and outreach plan is currently being drafted to meet the notification and outreach requirements of the act.

F4: Most governmental entities in Sonoma County — departments, cities, and other agencies — have yet to adopt sustainability provisions in their mission statements, goals, and programs, or to coordinate those efforts with other government entities.

We partially disagree with these findings.

In its most recent General Plan updated (2008), General Plan 2020, Sonoma County adopted the following policy:

GOAL WR-	Manage groundwater as a valuable and limited
2:	shared resource.

Objective Conserve, enhance and manage groundwater

WR-2.1: resources on a sustainable basis that assures sufficient

amounts of clean water required for future generations, the uses allowed by the General Plan, and the natural

environment.

ObjectiveDevelop a scientifically based program to collect the data needed to assess and understand groundwater

conditions.

Objective Encourage new groundwater recharge opportunities **WR-2.3:** and protect existing groundwater recharge areas.

Objective Increase institutional capacity and expertise within the WR-2.4: County to competently review hydrogeologic reports

and data for critical indicators and criteria.

Objective Avoid additional land subsidence caused by

WR-2.5: groundwater extraction.

The Water Agency has multi-jurisdictional funding agreements for groundwater studies and management in both Santa Rosa Plain (County, Water Agency, Cities of Santa Rosa, Rohnert Park, Cotati and Sebastopol, Town of Windsor and Cal-Am Water) and Sonoma Valley (County, Water Agency, Valley of the Moon Water District and Sonoma) and for groundwater studies and management and in Petaluma Valley (County, Water Agency and City of Petaluma) for groundwater studies. The purpose of these agreements is to coordinate groundwater management with the ultimate goal of sustainability.

The Water Agency's Water Supply Strategies and Strategic Plan include goals on integrated water management use; conjunctive water management (balancing the use of groundwater, surface water, recycled water and water conservation to ensure sustainability); and preparing for climate uncertainty through research that will lead to more effective management of all water resources.

In addition, the cities and water districts whose water is supplied by the Water Agency meet monthly to coordinate water supply and demand issues, with the goal of sustainably and cost-effective management of the resource.

In 2013, the City of Santa Rosa adopted a Groundwater Master Plan, which includes sustainability as a key objective.

This broad array of activities provides a solid foundation in the three basins for the creation and adoption of Groundwater Sustainability Plans, as required by the new law.

RECOMMENDATIONS

R1: Establish goals that include sustainability and recognize water sustainability as a specific goal.

R1 is being implemented. The Water Agency recognizes water sustainability in its Strategic Plan, and existing groundwater management plans in Sonoma Valley and Santa Rosa Plain have the ultimate goal of sustainability. Sonoma County has incorporated sustainable management of groundwater as a goal in its General Plan, and the Board of Supervisors has made sustainability, including water sustainability, a key priority. The development, progress toward and achievement of sustainability is a key part of the new law. Failure to achieve sustainability will result in the State Water Resources Control Board stepping in. The Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) creates a multi-step process for protecting local groundwater supplies.

The first step is to create Groundwater Sustainability Agencies (GSAs). The new law states that the GSA <u>must</u> be a public agency (or combination of agencies) that either manages or supplies water or that has land-use authority within the groundwater basin (primarily cities, counties and water districts). Once the GSAs are formed, they will develop detailed sustainability goals as part of the Groundwater Management Plans (GSPs). In Sonoma County, several public agencies are eligible to be part of the GSA in each basin, as follows:

- Santa Rosa Plain County, Water Agency, cities of Santa Rosa, Sebastopol, Cotati, Rohnert Park, and town of Windsor
- Sonoma Valley County, Water Agency, city of Sonoma, Valley of the Moon Water District, North Bay Water District
- o Petaluma County, Water Agency, city of Petaluma, North Bay Water District

Additionally, the existing groundwater management plans in the Santa Rosa Plain and Sonoma Valley both contain goals, objectives and recommended actions to sustainably manage groundwater resources. These existing plans will remain in effect until new GSPs are developed for those basins.

R3: Conduct a county-wide study of carrying capacity.

R3 has been partially implemented. The new law requires that GSAs develop and achieve a "sustainable yield," which is similar to carrying capacity for the affected basins. In the Santa Rosa Plain, Petaluma Valley and Sonoma Valley sophisticated computer models have been developed or are in the process of being developed of the groundwater and surface water systems. These models represent an essential step in estimating the sustainable yield of groundwater basins. To comply with the law, resources will first be focused on Santa Rosa Plain, Sonoma Valley and Petaluma River basins. If resources should become available, the sustainable yield (or carrying capacity) of other areas of the county could be determined.

R5: Continue funding as appropriate for the Sonoma County Water Agency to support the formation of suitable groundwater sustainability agencies and their early operations.

R5 is being implemented. The Water Agency Board of Directors approved a 2015-16 budget that includes funds for implementation of SGMA. In addition, the Water Agency, Sonoma County and other GSA-eligible agencies are seeking grant funding to assist with efforts to create the new GSA(s) and will continue to seek grant funds to assist in implementing the new act.

Human Services Department Response to Valley of the Moon Children's Home Grand Jury Report

FINDINGS

We agree with these finding(s):

F1: The Home appears to be an appropriate temporary place for minors to stay while their permanent residential status is being assessed and determined.

F3: The Home is effectively regulated and monitored by the Community Care and Licensing Division of the California Department of Social Services and inspected by the Sonoma County Juvenile Justice Commission.

We disagree partially with these findings:

F2: Although some minors' rights had been occasionally violted, the scope, severity and frequency of these violations were not critical and the Home quickly and appropriately corrected these violations. The Department does not agree that "some minors' rights had been occasionally violated." There were instead instances of non-compliance with State regulations that were corrected when directed to do so by Community Care Licensing. The Department agrees that "the scope, severity and frequency of these" issues "were not critical and the Home quickly and appropriately corrected" them.

F4: Administrative staff of the Sonoma County Department of Health Services and the Home are cooperative with and receipt to being evaluated by outside agencies. The initial printed release of the Grand Jury Report incorrectly refers to the Department as the "Health Department". This has been corrected in the on-line version to the "Human Services Department". The Department agrees that Administrative staff of the Home are cooperative with and receptive to being evaluated by outside agencies.

RECOMMENDATIONS

SONOMA COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE RESPONSE TO THE 2014-2015 GRAND JURY REPORT

County Detention Facilities

FINDINGS

F1. MADF and other detention facilities within the County are well managed and maintained.

RESPONSE: The respondent agrees with the finding.

F2. The current influx of drugs into adult detention facilities poses an increased risk of violent behavior, medical emergencies, and a burden on the correctional staff.

RESPONSE: The respondent agrees with the finding.

F3. The increased jail population resulting from Realignment is placing a strain on MADF staff and has resulted in onerous mandatory overtime requirements.

RESPONSE: The respondent agrees with the finding.

F4. Inadequate space and staffing in the intake/booking area is resulting in long delays in the admissions process.

RESPONSE: The respondent agrees with the finding.

RECOMMENDATIONS

R1. Use of a full-body scanning device and a trained K-9 sniffer dog be implemented at the earliest opportunity to reduce the flow of contraband into the jail.

RESPONSE: The recommendation has been implemented.

The respondent agrees with and has implemented the recommendation both for a scanning device and K-9. The Sheriff's Office had implemented both these projects prior to the release of the Grand Jury Report.

A full body scanner was installed at the Main Adult Detention Facility (MADF) in spring of 2015. As of the writing of this response, inmates are being scanned before they are transferred from the Booking area to their assigned housing unit. The scanner is also used to randomly search inmate

work crews returning to the NCDF. Additionally, the scanner is used for inmate searches as deemed beneficial by correctional deputy staff for safety and security of the facility. Since the implementation of the scanner we have been experiencing a higher frequency of inmates admitting to contraband on their person prior to being scanned. However, due to the newness of the device, we have not have sufficient time to fully evaluate the effectiveness of the scanner. As staff have more opportunity to use the device, they will become more proficient in reading scans and are likely to improve their ability to identify smuggled items. Once full proficiency is gained, we will use available data to determine the effectiveness of the scanner and on the safety and security of the facility.

The Sheriff's Office Detention Division has established a Detention K-9 Program. The Division has one narcotics K-9 team consisting of one dog and one correctional deputy handler. The dog is a two year old Belgian Malinois named Sasha. The K-9 team has completed 200 hours of training and where certified by the California Narcotic Canine Association in March of 2015. Since Sasha and her handler have been trained, they have conducted over 200 adult detention facility searches. The team is averaging 15 searches a week in both MADF and NCDF. These searches have produced both narcotics and tobacco.

We feel that both the implementation of the full body scanner and the narcotics detection K-9 team will improve the safety and security of the County's adult detention facilities for both inmates and staff.

R2. (a) Aggressive efforts to recruit new correctional officers be pursued in order to reduce mandatory overtime requirements and (b) maximize the use of NCDF.

RESPONSE: The recommendation R2 (a) has been implemented.

The respondent agrees with the recommendation that efforts should be ongoing to hire new personnel. Since FY 12-13, with the Board of Supervisors approval and funding, the Sheriff's Office has engaged in an intensive hiring effort to increase the rate at which new staff are hired. This effort has continued throughout FY 13-14 and FY 14-15. Efforts have included adding a significant amount of resources to the Sheriff's Office Personnel Bureau including the addition of temporary background investigator and support staffing. Based on the results over the past three years, we have learned that this effort, while assisting with the hiring deficit, has not been adequate to keep up with attrition. To truly meet the objective of getting and staying ahead of the hiring curve on-going resources will have to be dedicated to this effort. To that end, the Board of Supervisors approved a permanent increase in Personnel Bureau staffing in the FY 15-16 adopted budget.

The lowest vacancy rate in the correctional deputy job class during this intensive hiring effort has been six. Fatigued staff continue to become sick and injured as a result of the current staffing shortages. The average unavailability rate for correctional deputies in FY 14-15 was 30.5% or 55 out of 180 positions. Unavailability accounts for vacant positions plus staff who are still employed but unable to work due to illness or injury. This unavailability rate has increased to unprecedented levels, compounding the need for mandatory overtime as existing staff are required to cover the open shifts.

Sheriff's Office management and Personnel Bureau staff are analyzing current hiring practices and assessing ways to improve the effectiveness of our hiring efforts. We will need to continually search for ways to expand our candidate pool, attach qualified candidates, and streamline the background process whenever possible.

RESPONSE: The recommendation R2 (b) will not be implemented because it is not reasonable.

The Sheriff's Office does not support maximizing the use NCDF. Outside consultants have reviewed the facility in consideration of the current state of the detention environment and have determined that the current conditions and design of NCDF does not appropriately meet the needs of the inmates that need to be housed. A draft of the County's Criminal Justice Master Plan cites, "The NCDF has inadequate security systems, poor physical plant conditions, will require substantial investment to operate in the future, and is not well-suited for the type of inmate population housed there." In response to these findings and the difficulties associated with managing NCDF, the County is in the process of submitting an AB 863 grant application which includes a focus on permanently closing one of the NCDF housing units. The Sheriff's Office agrees that more bed space needs to be utilized whenever possible at both detention facilities; however, such inmate beds need to be appropriate type of housing for the corresponding inmate population.

R3. The Department continue efforts to expand the booking /intake area at MADF.

RESPONSE: The recommendation has been implemented.

The MADF booking area needs have been a priority for the Sheriff's Office. The project continues to be ranked amongst the highest of the capital project needs for the Office. The MADF booking area project is also at the forefront of the County's Capital Project Plan with a 2015-17 stated budget objective of "Support...Booking Space Evaluation and Renovation...". To date, \$545,000 has been set aside in the Capital Project budget for this project. The Sheriff's Office will continue work in collaboration with the General Services Department and the County Administrator to prioritize this project within the limited resources available.

Permit and Resource Management Department's Response to Sonoma County Civil Grand Jury Report

Presiding Judge Knoss and Foreperson Jones:

Thank you for the 2014-2015 Sonoma County Civil Grand Jury Report on the Permit and Resource Management Department. On behalf of our staff, thank you for taking the time to visit us, tour our office, and take the time to learn about our operations. We really appreciated all three visits and the follow up questions.

Please find below our responses to the Grand Jury's recommendations.

FINDINGS

We agree with these finding(s):

- 1. PRMD is committed to creating a customer friendly service department and has made significant progress in achieving this goal.
- 2. The PRMD code violation complaint process is unable to provide customers with notification of the status or the resolution of their complaints.
- 3. Spanish speaking customers are not well served by PRMD's information services, most of which, including the code violation complaint forms, are provided only in English.

RECOMMENDATIONS

R1. PRMD design and implement a process to notify customers when their code violation complaints have been resolved or otherwise concluded.

Response: Recommendation R1 has been implemented.

A directive has been issued that Code Enforcement Officers must inform complainants of the disposition of complaints. Acknowledgement of the receipt of complaint will correspond to the medium in which the complaint was filed, letters, email, telephone. In addition to this policy that is already implemented, the investigative results of the code violation will be listed in the database, Accela. The Accela will be going live in April 2016. There will be a description and status of complaints once a Notice of Violation is filed.

R2. PRMD identify an employee to assist customers with their questions or concerns about the complaint process.

Response: Recommendation R2 has been implemented.

The Department already complies with this recommendation. The PRMD Ombudsman very ably assists customers with their questions, concerns, and complaints. The Ombudsman aids customers in navigating both the permitting process and the complaint process. Customers and Department staff have really found value in the Ombudsman's service. In order to be more

accessible to the public the Ombudsman's office was relocated to the customer service lobby and is open to the public. PRMD also has the Ombudsman's mission and contact information on the monitor screens viewed by customers while in the office.

R3. PRMD provide all relevant information concerning customer services in both English and Spanish.

Response: Recommendation R1 has not been implemented but will be implemented in the future.

The Department accepts this recommendation. While PRMD has several staff out of 109 FTE's who are bilingual, this can be improved. Our literature is also presented mostly in English even though a significant portion of our customers communicate in Spanish as their first language. PRMD has begun to translate paper handouts into Spanish. By the end of this 2015-2016 fiscal year, all handouts will be available in Spanish and English.

Within budgetary and personnel resources, the Department will commit to hiring a Spanish-speaking Permit Technician, a staffer uniquely positioned to help Spanish speakers navigate through the permit process.

Sonoma County Water Agency Response to Sustainable Water for Sonoma County Grand Jury Report

FINDINGS

We agree with these findings:

- F1: Recent changes in California water law establish requirements for managing groundwater as a long-term sustainable resource, administered by local Groundwater Sustainability Agencies.
- F2: Sonoma County is better served if Groundwater Sustainability Agencies are established in advance of state-mandated deadlines, using criteria that assure broad participation.
- F5: The Sonoma County Water Agency has participated significantly in preparations for sustainable water management, and can continue to contribute in the transition to management through groundwater sustainability agencies.
- F6: Economic and environmental sustainability are interdependent; economic sustainability can be achieved only when critical resources such as water are also managed for sustainability.
- F7: The has been no cross-discipline study of carrying capacity in Sonoma County that projects what population the water and other resources in Sonoma County are capable of supporting.

We disagree wholly or partially with these finding(s):

F3: Water agencies within Sonoma County have yet to sufficiently educate groundwater users about their responsibilities for sharing water resources, potential limitations on water use, and the advantages of making sure, through sustainability, that water will be available in the future for their own use.

We partially disagree with this finding. Both Sonoma Valley and Santa Rosa Plain groundwater basins have groundwater management plans developed under the pre-Sustainable Groundwater Management Act groundwater management planning statutory scheme (AB 3030 and SB 1938). The Water Agency is the lead agency in these efforts, working with basin advisory panels to develop and implement groundwater management plans in each basin. The basin advisory panels include representatives from agriculture, environmental groups, residential well owners, the County, cities, tribes, and community water districts. These voluntary, non-regulatory plans are an excellent first step toward groundwater sustainability, and will significantly advance the region's ability to comply with the SGMA by establishing a robust data collection and monitoring program and by promoting, studying and implementing programs and projects aimed at sustaining the

basins' groundwater resources. These existing plans also foster stakeholder coordination and public outreach, both of which are essential elements of the Act. Numerous public meetings, workshop and briefings regarding groundwater conditions and management activities have been conducted through these existing groundwater management programs. In the Petaluma Valley basin, the Water Agency and the City of Petaluma are currently engaged in a 3-year United States Geological Survey study, initiated in September 2014, to analyze groundwater use and conditions.

Using funds from a water conservation grant, the Sonoma County Water Agency is sending a flyer to all groundwater well owners in the Santa Rosa Plain notifying them of the new act and of a program that provides free water-efficient toilets and other products to well owners. Finally, a communications and outreach plan is currently being drafted to meet the notification and outreach requirements of the act.

F4: Most governmental entities in Sonoma County — departments, cities, and other agencies — have yet to adopt sustainability provisions in their mission statements. goals, and programs, or to coordinate those efforts with other government entities.

We partially disagree with these findings...

In its most recent General Plan updated (2008), General Plan 2020, the County adopted the following policy:

The Water Agency has multi-jurisdictional funding agreements for groundwater studies and management in both Santa Rosa Plain (County, Water Agency, Cities of Santa Rosa, Rohnert Park, Cotati and Sebastopol, Town of Windsor and Cal-Am Water) and Sonoma Valley (County, Water Agency, Valley of the Moon Water District and Sonoma) and for groundwater studies and management and in Petaluma Valley (County, Water Agency and City of Petaluma) for groundwater studies. The purpose of these agreements is to coordinate groundwater management with the ultimate goal of sustainability.

The Water Agency's Water Supply Strategies and Strategic Plan include goals on integrated water management use; conjunctive water management (balancing the use of groundwater, surface water, recycled water and water conservation to ensure sustainability); and preparing for climate uncertainty through research that will lead to more effective management of all water resources.

In addition, the cities and water districts whose water is supplied by the Water Agency meet monthly to coordinate water supply and demand issues, with the goal of sustainably and cost-effective management of the resource.

In 2013, the City of Santa Rosa adopted a Groundwater Master Plan, which includes sustainability as a key objective.

This broad array of activities provides a solid foundation in the three basin for the creation and adoption of Groundwater Sustainability Plans, as required by the new law.

RECOMMENDATIONS

R1: Establish goals that include sustainability and recognize water sustainability as a specific goal.

R1 is being implemented. The Water Agency recognizes water sustainability in its Strategic Plan, and existing groundwater management plans in Sonoma Valley and Santa Rosa Plain have the ultimate goal of sustainability. The County has incorporated sustainable management of groundwater as a goal in its General Plan, and the Board of Supervisors has made sustainability, including water sustainability, a key priority. The development, progress toward and achievement of sustainability is a key part of the new law. Failure to achieve sustainability will result in the State Water Resources Control Board stepping in. The Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) creates a multi-step process for protecting local groundwater supplies.

The first step is to create Groundwater Sustainability Agencies (GSAs). The new law states that the GSA <u>must</u> be a public agency (or combination of agencies) that either manages or supplies water or that has land-use authority within the groundwater basin (primarily cities, counties and water districts). Once the GSAs are formed, they will develop detailed sustainability goals as part of the Groundwater Management Plans (GSPs). In Sonoma County, several public agencies are eligible to be part of the GSA in each basin, as follows:

 Santa Rosa Plain – County, Water Agency, cities of Santa Rosa, Sebastopol, Cotati, Rohnert Park, and town of Windsor

- Sonoma Valley County, Water Agency, city of Sonoma, Valley of the Moon Water District, North Bay Water District
- o Petaluma County, Water Agency, city of Petaluma, North Bay Water District

Additionally, the existing groundwater management plans in the Santa Rosa Plain and Sonoma Valley both contain goals, objectives and recommended actions to sustainably manage groundwater resources. These existing plans will remain in effect until new GSPs are developed for those basins.

R2: Assign a high priority to implementing the new water sustainability law.

R2 has been implemented. The County Board of Supervisors/Water Agency Board of Directors closely followed this important legislation as it made its way through the Legislature. Within a month of the law's passage, the BOS/Board received an analysis of the act and appointed Water Agency Chief Engineer Jay Jasperse to coordinate a county/water agency working group. The county/water agency working group has been meeting regularly since the fall of 2014 and has spoken to multiple interest groups and organizations, established a web page and materials to inform the public about SGMA, developed principles for GSA formation and recommended a process for moving forward.

In March 2015, the Board of Supervisors/Water Agency Board of Directors approved a robust facilitated assessment of all the entities eligible to serve as GSAs and of other interested parties, including agriculture, well owners, tribes and environmental interests. The assessment is nearly complete, and in early fall the facilitator will make recommendations for a process for GSA formation. While it's important to act quickly, it's also important to get it right. There are many potential agencies that could serve as GSAs in each basin and it's critical to understand their interests and goals.

R3: Conduct a county-wide study of carrying capacity.

R3 has been partially implemented. The new law requires that GSAs develop and achieve a "sustainable yield," which is similar to carrying capacity for the affected basins. In the Santa Rosa Plain, Petaluma Valley and Sonoma Valley sophisticated computer models have been developed or are in the process of being developed of the groundwater and surface water systems. These models represent an essential step in estimating the sustainable yield of groundwater basins. To comply with the law, resources will first be focused on Santa Rosa Plain, Sonoma Valley and Petaluma River basins. If resources should become available, the sustainable yield (or carrying capacity) of other areas of the county could be determined.

R4: Use the existing groundwater management plans as foundations for issuing new groundwater sustainability plans for two of Sonoma County's major basins.

R4 is being implemented. The Basin Advisory Panels in Sonoma Valley and Santa Rosa Plain are receiving regular SGMA updates at their meetings. One of the principles adopted by the BOS/Board in March was to build on the existing groundwater management plans, and the good work done by the diverse community stakeholders in the Santa Rosa Plain and Sonoma Valley basins.

R5: Continue funding as appropriate for the Sonoma County Water Agency to support the formation of suitable groundwater sustainability agencies and their early operations.

R5 is being implemented. The Water Agency Board of Directors approved a 2015-16 budget that includes funds for implementation of SGMA. In addition, the Water Agency, County and other GSA-eligible agencies are seeking grant funding to assist with efforts to create the new GSA(s) and will continue to seek grant funds to assist in implementing the new act.

Title: Solid Waste Independent Hearing Officer / Hearing Panel Procedure

Recommended Actions:

(1) Adopt a procedure to appoint a Solid Waste Independent Hearing Officer to act as the local appeals body for solid waste permitting and enforcement issues; (2) Disband the Solid Waste Hearing Panel; (3) Rescind Resolution No. 92-0156 which established the Solid Waste Hearing Panel in 1992.

Executive Summary:

This measure establishes an appeal procedure for actions of the Solid Waste Local Enforcement Agency (LEA). It recommends that the County change its appeal process to use a hearing officer model and to adopt a set of hearing procedures. As an alternative, the Board could maintain a three person hearing panel and come back at a future time for appointments.

Historically, the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors ("Board") has had a Hearing Panel and has made appropriate appointments and reappointments to the panel since 1992. The hearing panel has been designated with the State Board as the local hearing body. The hearing panel has been comprised of one technical expert member, one member of the public at large, and one Board member. The panel has never been called to conduct a hearing since its appointment in 1992.

Background

In 1992, the California Integrated Waste Management Board (currently CalRecycle) certified the Department of Health Services, Environmental Health and Safety Section, as the Solid Waste Local Enforcement Agency (LEA) for Sonoma County. The LEA enforces California state solid waste laws and regulations pertaining to permitting and enforcement at solid waste facilities.

The California Public Resource Code and California Code of Regulations require the LEA to have an independent hearing panel or a hearing officer in a jurisdiction, such as the County of Sonoma, that has a publicly owned or operated solid waste facility or disposal site. (Public Resource Code § 44308; California Code of Regulations Title 14, § 18060). The hearing panel or hearing officer acts as the local appeals body for solid waste permitting and enforcement issues, such as denial, suspension, or revocation of a permit, recommended permit conditions, enforcement actions against unpermitted facilities and/or other enforcement actions, as well as the LEA's failure to act as required by law or regulation. The hearing panel or hearing officer holds hearings upon request made by the person subject to the action or by a person alleging that the LEA failed to act, and decides whether to grant or deny relief to the party requesting the hearing. Decisions of the hearing panel or hearing officer may be appealed to the State Board (California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery, "CalRecycle"). Hearing policy and procedures are to be developed at the local level, within state mandated guidelines, which allows each hearing panel or hearing officer to better respond to local needs and community standards.

It is recommended that a hearing officer is appointed as the governing body of the enforcement agency. That option is available if the governing body adopts procedures for making that appointment and has adopted qualifications that the hearing officer is required to meet. (Public Resource Code § 44308(d)).

The procedural rules for conducting the hearing and making findings and decisions are essentially the same for a hearing panel or a hearing officer, except that a hearing officer can decide a dispute based on a single vote as opposed to a majority vote of the panel. Recommended qualifications for a hearing officer would include a license to practice law in the State of California and subject matter expertise concerning solid waste issues.

In order to simplify the appointment procedure, it is recommended that the Board adopt a procedure to appoint a hearing officer, instead of a three member panel, under Public Resource Code § 44308(d) and California Code of Regulations Title 14, § 18060. Specifically, it is recommended that the Board adopt the attached "Procedures for Appointment of Hearing Officers for Hearings on Matters Related to Local Enforcement Agency Proceedings." If the Board adopts this procedure, recruitment efforts will begin immediately and staff will seek qualified individuals to be considered by the Board on September 15, 2015, to serve as hearing officer.

If the Board adopts this procedure, it is also recommended that the Board disband the Solid Waste Hearing Panel, and rescind Resolution No. 92-0156 which established the Solid Waste Hearing Panel in 1992.

Alternative:

The Board appoints a Solid Waste Independent Hearing Panel consisting of three panel members. Panel members are selected for their legal, administrative, or technical abilities in areas relating to solid waste management, and include: one solid waste technical expert, one member of the public at large, and not more than one member of the governing body. The members serve a four year term and may not serve more than two consecutive terms. The chair of the Board appoints the independent hearing panel. If a panel member does not complete their term, the chairperson of the governing body shall appoint a

replacement to serve out the remainder of the unexpired term. Members of the hearing panel may receive per diem and necessary expenses while conducting the hearing.

In order to highlight the independence of the hearing panel and to avoid the appearance of any potential conflicts at the local government level, it is recommended that the Chair of the Board appoints, as ratified by the Board, members to the hearing panel that are not also members of the local governing body. Such procedure would be consistent with Public Resource Code § 44308, which does not require any member of the governing body to serve as member of the hearing panel.

Currently, the positions of all three panel members are vacant. If the Board adopts this procedure, staff will return to the Board on September 15, 2015, with recommendations to appoint members to the independent hearing panel.

Resolutions 92-0156, 92-0470, 95-0265, 00-0474, 03-0575, 05-0904, and 11-0430 appointing panel members.

Pursuant to the provisions of the California Public Resources Code (PRC) concerning activities of the Local Enforcement Agency (LEA), including but not limited to those provisions set forth in PRC Sections 44308, et seq., the Sonoma County Clerk of the Board of Supervisors shall determine, consistent with the requirements set forth below, a proposed hearing officer, whose qualifications shall be set forth and presented to the Board of Supervisors for consideration of appointment as a hearing officer.
- 2. A hearing officer approved by the Board of Supervisors shall conduct all proceedings in accordance with the applicable provisions set forth in the California Public Resources Code.
- 3. For consideration as a hearing officer in the above described role, a person shall be licensed as a member of the State Bar of California for a minimum of eight years prior to appointment.
- 4. For consideration as a hearing officer, a person shall demonstrate experience and familiarity with the current law in the state of California concerning solid waste issues.
- 5. For consideration as a hearing officer, a person shall demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Clerk of the Board or his/her designee that the person possesses a judicial demeanor consistent with the impartial conduct of any proceedings.
- 6. The Board of Supervisors shall consider and take action on the recommendation received from the Clerk of the Board. Any such appointment shall be effective for two years unless earlier terminated by either party with 30 days notice.
- 7. Additional hearing officers may be appointed who may serve on a rotational basis.
- 8. If no hearing officer is available to conduct a hearing, the County may request services from the California State Office of Administrative Hearings on a case-by-case basis, as necessary.

Executive Summary:

Board approval and authorization is requested to allow the District Attorney to participate in the Victim/Witness Assistance Program funded by the California Office of Emergency Services in the amount of \$297,875.

The California Office of Emergency Services Agency Grant

The California Office of Emergency Services (CalOES) Victim/Witness Assistance grant award provides funds to support the salaries and benefits for 2.0 FTE Victim Witness Advocate positions and a 0.60 Victim Services Division Director. District Attorney's Office has participated in the Victim/Witness Assistance Program annually since 1986, and receives an award amount based on available combined State and Federal pass-through funds. This year, the CalOES Victim/Witness Assistance grant award is \$297,875, for the term July 1, 2015, to June 30, 2016.

California Penal Code Section 13835 mandates services to meet the needs of victims and witnesses of crime through funding local and victim/witness services programs. Staff funded through this grant provide comprehensive mandatory and optional services to crime victims and witnesses for all types of crimes, whether or not the suspect has been identified. Objectives under this grant include providing advocacy for the majority of crime victims who go through the criminal justice system, in both adult and juvenile cases, as soon as possible after the crime occurs; contacting and offering services to victims where prosecution is not being pursued, but where the victims still qualify for service; collaborating with law enforcement, community based organizations, and other victim service organizations to provide the most comprehensive response to meet the needs of crime victims in Sonoma County; and providing

community outreach and training to law enforcement, community based organizations, and the community at large on the services available to crime victims through the Sonoma County District Attorney's Victim Services Division.

Prior Board Actions:

Agreements with CalOES have been approved annually since the inception of this program in 1986.

Executive Summary:

The Sonoma-Marin Area Rail Transit (SMART) project will provide passenger rail service from Cloverdale in Sonoma County to Larkspur Landing in Marin County. This action will provide PG&E an aerial easement across County property to the SMART Operations and Maintenance Facility (Facility). In accord with the CEQA approved project the easement will allow PG&E to connect existing overhead lines to the Facility.

The easement will cross five linear feet of County-owned land occupied by the General Services Fleet Heavy Equipment maintenance facility ("County Land"). (Please see attached site map.) General Service's staff has reviewed the easement alignment as it relates to County Land, and determined that there will be no negative impact on current or anticipated County operations. Staff has also noted and conveyed to SMART that greater consideration should be devoted to the long-term visual impact of the developed site on the local community. Continued proliferation of aerial lines crossing the site can result in an unattractive facility. Future development efforts should include burying lines where possible and minimizing the visibility of lines that cannot be buried underground. The proposed easement will deliver significant value to SMART, and SMART has offered the County the fair market value of \$1,000 as compensation for the proposed easement.

Staff requests that your Board authorize the Board Chair to execute the proposed "Sonoma-Marin Area Rail Transit Utility Easement Offer-Acceptance" and the accompanying Easement Deed to convey to PG&E the easement across and access to certain County property for the purpose of installing and maintaining overhanging wires, cables and the like for the distribution of electrical energy and communication purposes. As required by Government Code Section25526.6, staff also requests that your Board make findings that the proposed easement is in the public interest and will not substantially conflict or interfere with the County's use of the County Land.

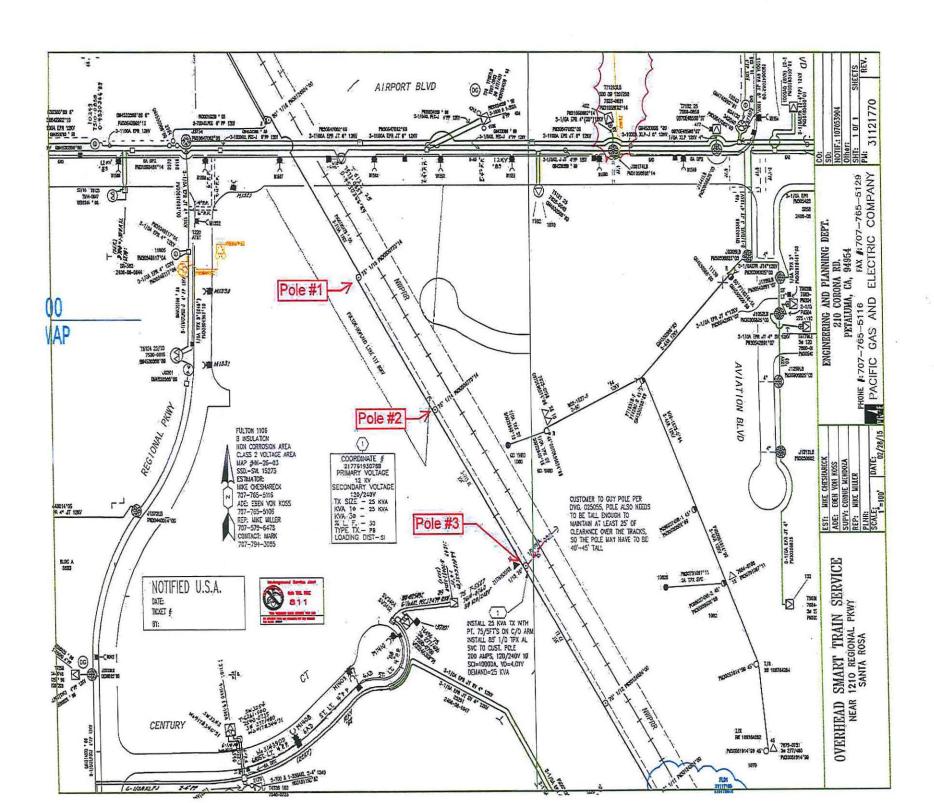

Executive Summary:

Background:

The County of Sonoma maintains a network of wireless communication facilities that provides voice radio and wireless data communication for essential services, including the 911 dispatch system, emergency fire services, emergency medical response services, law enforcement, and other first responder, public safety and public works agencies. Services for the west central coastal area of the county are currently supported from the outdated and aged Seaview communications site.

Project Description:

The Meyers Grade project is to erect a 180' communications tower with all County required antennas, supports, and cabling which will terminate in to a new 20' X 30' concrete communications equipment vault. The project includes all necessary site access, screen landscaping, electrical power and emergency generator support required. The project site is located on a county owned property, in northwestern Sonoma County, north of the community of Jenner. This new facility will be a part of the essential services network supported for improved public safety. The Sheriff's Telecommunications Bureau has reviewed the specifications and found them satisfactory to meet their needs for this project.

Public Bid:

A Notice Inviting Bids for the Meyers Grade Communications Tower and Vault Project was advertised on June 7, 2015 and June 14, 2015. The Construction Drawings and Specifications were made available on June 8, 2015 through the County of Sonoma Supplier Portal, the North Coast Builders Exchange, and at the Facilities Development and Management office, located at 2300 County Center Drive, Suite A220, Santa Rosa, CA. A mandatory pre-bid meeting and site walk was held at 10:00 AM on Thursday, June 18, 2015. Two Addenda to the Construction Documents were released during the bid period. The public bid opening was held at 2:00 PM on Wednesday July 1, 2015.

Bid Results:

Two bids were received with the difference between them of only \$1,698. A.E. Nelson Construction is the lowest responsive and responsible bidder at \$1,037,800. The engineer's estimate is \$1,110,000. Based on comparison to the engineers estimate, staff believes that this is a fair and reasonable price and represents good value to the County and recommends the Board award a construction contract to A.E. Nelson Construction for the Meyers Grade Communications Tower and Vault in the amount of \$1,037,800 and authorize the Chair to execute the contract.

Kleinfelder West, Inc. of Santa Rosa, CA. was originally contracted to provide soils engineering services for analysis and confirmation of building structural and tower base foundation design utilizing an Open Scope Professional Services Agreement. It is recommended Kleinfelder West, Inc. continue during the construction phase, to provide special inspections and materials testing services as required by the California Building Code and to confirm compliance with the permitted design documents. Continuing with Kleinfelder West, Inc. as the special testing and inspection consultant reduces the likelihood of construction phase errors or deficiencies, attributed to their thorough knowledge of the site conditions and California Building Code requirements and standards for Emergency Services construction.

Schedule:

Work is scheduled to begin in August 2015 and be complete by January 2016.

Funding:

The project budget is \$1,441,900 allocated into the following budget categories:

Construction: \$1,110,856
A/E Services: \$76,230
Other Consultants: \$38,579
Permits/Fees \$106,235
Project Management: \$72,000
Special Inspections: \$38,000
TOTAL: \$1,441,900

The lowest responsive and responsible bid is for \$1,037,800 and the cost for special inspections and testing is \$37,177. The cost of these proposed contracts are within the project budget and have been reviewed and approved by the Sheriff's Office for project construction.

Executive Summary:

Action Requested of the Board of Supervisors: The Board previously initiated phase-out of substandard parcels, but allows owners to replace their contracts when they qualify for a different type of contract. Vernazza Vineyards, LLC seeks approval of a replacement Land Conservation Act Contract for prime agricultural land planted in vineyards. Your Board is requested to adopt a resolution to rescind an existing Non-Prime contract and replace it with a new Prime contract for a 29.27+/- acre parcel within Agricultural Preserve 2-251 and authorize the Chair to execute the replacement Land Conservation Act Contract and attached Land Conservation Plan.

Location, Zoning and Project Description: The project site is located in the Santa Rosa plains located at 5365 Stony Point Rd, Santa Rosa. The project site is 29.27+/- acres with a commercial vineyard planted in 2001 and grazing. The base zoning is LEA (Land Extensive Agriculture) with a 60 acre density with the following combining districts: Z (Second Unit Exclusion), F1 (Floodway), F2 (Secondary Floodplain), SR (Scenic Resources), VOH (Valley Oak Habitat).

Background: The parcel was originally placed under a non-prime (Type II) Land Conservation Act Contract in 1974. The 29.27 acre parcel is less than the 40- acre minimum parcel size requirement for a Non-Prime contract. In 2013, the Board of Supervisors initiated phase-out of undersized parcels and this parcel was under the County-wide initiated phase out of all parcels substandard in size for their

contract. The Notice of Non-Renewal for the subject parcel was recorded under OR# 2013-073797 and went into effect January 1, 2014. If the Board of Supervisors does not approve a replacement contract, the property will phase out of the program over the next eight years.

As part of the Board of Supervisors' December 2011 update of the Sonoma County Uniform Rules for Agricultural Preserves and Farmland Security Zones ("Uniform Rules") the Board eliminated the distinction between Prime (Type I) and Non-Prime (Type II) Agricultural Preserves. This allows the County to enter into either a Prime or Non-Prime contract in any established Preserve. The subject land at issue here is within an established Preserve (2-251).

Also as part of the update of the Uniform Rules, the County has implemented use of a Land Conservation Plan which is attached to and incorporated into a Land Conservation Act Contract. The Land Conservation Plans show locations of various agricultural, open space, permitted, and compatible land uses on contracted land. Future changes to the Land Conservation Plan may be approved by the Director of PRMD and recorded on title of the subject parcel.

Replacement Prime Land Conservation Act Contract on land located within an existing Agricultural Preserve:

The parcel qualifies for a Land Conservation Act Contract for prime agricultural land as described in the findings and discussion in the Resolution (to Attachment A).

<u>Staff Recommendation:</u> Staff recommends the Board of Supervisors approve the request because all of the state and local requirements for a Prime Land Conservation Act Contract for the 29.27+/- acres within an existing Agricultural Preserve have been met.

Prior Board Actions:

On December 13, 2011, the Board approved the *Sonoma County Uniform Rules for Agricultural Preserves and Farmland Security Zones* (Resolution No. 11-0678). In addition, this Board of Supervisors Resolution authorized PRMD to non-renew substandard sized parcels unless a replacement contract is obtained.

Narrative Explanation of Fiscal Impacts (If Required):

Approval of the replacement Land Conservation Act Contract means that the owner will continue to pay a reduced property tax assessment based upon the value of the agricultural uses rather than the land value under Proposition 13. This results in a reduction in the County's share of property tax revenue for each parcel under a Land Conservation Act Contract. The amount of this reduction for an individual contract depends on parcel-specific variables including the Proposition 13 status of the land and the value of the agricultural crop, and is determined annually by the Assessor's office. The Board has not requested, and staff does not recommend, evaluating property tax revenue implications on a contract-by-contract basis. Instead, the Board has directed that, as a policy matter, approving new contracts is important to the County's agricultural economy and outweighs the cost in reduced property tax revenue.

Whereas, a request has been made by the property owner Vernazza Vineyards, LLC to authorize the Chair to rescind an existing Land Conservation (Williamson) Act Contract and replace it with a new Land Conservation Act Contract and attached Land Conservation Plan, for prime agricultural land located at 5365 Stony Point Rd, Santa Rosa, APN: 046-031-014, Supervisorial District No. 5; and

Whereas, on December 13, 2011, the Board of Supervisors adopted the updated *Sonoma County Uniform Rules for Agricultural Preserves and Farmland Security Zones (Uniform Rules)* (Resolution No. 11-0678); and

Whereas, consistent with the *Uniform Rules*, County Counsel has revised the Land Conservation Act Contract form, which now incorporates a Land Conservation Plan identifying the various uses of the contracted land. Future changes to identified land uses require amendment of the Land Conservation Plan. The Board, pursuant to Resolution No. 11-0678, has authorized the Director of PRMD to approve amendments to executed Land Conservation Plans; and

Whereas, the Board of Supervisors finds that the 29.27+/- acre parcel is currently located within Agricultural Preserve 2-251, and presently meets the requirements for a new Prime (Type I) Land Conservation Act Contract.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Board of Supervisors makes the following specific findings concerning the requirements for a new Prime (Type I) Land Conservation Act Contract ("Contract"):

1. As required by Uniform Rule 4.2, the land proposed to be restricted by the Contract is currently located within a designated Agricultural

Preserve (2-251); and

- 2. Consistent with Uniform Rule 4.2, the land is devoted to an agricultural use. In Sonoma County this means that at least 50% of the parcel is used for agriculture purposes. The 29.27+/- acre parcel has 19.5 acres planted in vineyard, therefore, over 66% of the parcel is being used for agricultural purposes. A commercial vineyard is a prime agricultural use. Another 7 acres of the parcel is used for cattle grazing; and
- 3. As required by Uniform Rule 4.2, the land proposed to be restricted by the Contract is a single legal parcel; and
- 4. As required by Uniform Rule 4.2, there is a minimum parcel size for contracts. The land must be at least 10 acres in size for a Prime Land Conservation Act contract. The 29.27+/- acre parcel exceeds the 10-acre minimum parcel size for a new Prime Land Conservation Act Contract.
- 5. As required by Uniform Rule 4.2, the land proposed to be restricted by the Contract presently meets the minimum annual commercial agricultural income requirement of \$1,000.00 per acre gross for vineyard land under a Prime Land Conservation Act Contract. The vineyard operation generates an income on average 10,350.00 per acre gross over the last five years. Also, the 7 acres of pasture leased for cattle grazing generated an additional income from the rent of \$1,000.00 gross per year; and
- 6. All non-agricultural uses of the land are allowed as compatible uses in Uniform Rule 8.0, and consistent with Government Code Section 51238.1. Currently, the parcel is undeveloped with any structures; and
- 7. As required by Uniform Rule 4.2, Prime contracts for parcels under 40 acres in size must be on designated prime farmland. Prime farmland is defined as land planted with fruit- or nut-bearing trees, vines, bushes, or crops which have a nonbearing period of less than five years and meet the minimum income requirements. The parcel is planted with 19.5 acres of vineyard comprised of Pinot Noir and Chardonnay grapes that have produced an income over the last five years, and therefore meets the definition of prime farmland.

Be It Further Resolved that the Board of Supervisors finds the requested action categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Section 15317, of the State CEQA Guidelines, which provides that executing a new Land Conservation Act Contract is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act.

Be It Further Resolved that the Board of Supervisors hereby grants the request by approving rescission of the existing Non-Prime (Type II) contract and simultaneous replacement of that contract with a new Prime Land Conservation Act Contract and attached Land Conservation Plan, to restrict the 29.27 +/- acre parcel located at 5365 Stony Point Rd, Santa Rosa, APN: 046-031-014..

Be It Further Resolved that the Board of Supervisors authorizes the Chair of the Board of Supervisors to execute the Land Conservation Act Contract and attached Land Conservation Plan.

Be It Further Resolved that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors is hereby instructed to record within 20 days and no later than December 31, 2015 (1) this Resolution and (2) the associated Land Conservation Act Contract and attached Land Conservation Plan with the Office of the Sonoma County Recorder.

Be It Further Resolved that the Board of Supervisors designates the Clerk of the Board as the custodian of the documents and other material which constitute the record of proceedings upon which the decision herein is based, including the original executed Contract and Land Conservation Plan. Adopt a Resolution and Conditions of Approval for a Lot Line Adjustment between two parcels with one parcel subject to a Land Conservation Contract and one parcel subject to an Open Space Easement for property located at 2364 Geysers Road and 2457 Wilson Road, Geyserville; APN's 131-030-027 and 131-040-021.

Executive Summary:

Introduction: This item is to approve a Lot Line Adjustment to effectuate a change in ownership of 2.5 acres between two adjacent lot owners. This Lot Line Adjustment requires Board of Supervisors approval because of the existing Land Conservation (Williamson) Act Contract on one of the parcels. Lot Line Adjustments are normally approved administratively by PRMD or by the Project Review and Advisory Committee.

Background: This action would transfer 2.5 acres from Lot 2 to Lot 1. Lot 2 of the Lot Line Adjustment is also Lot 8 of a recently recorded subdivision MJS04-0006 - Hall Ranch Subdivision. The Lot Line Adjustment was submitted during the processing of the Hall Ranch subdivision. As part of the subdivision approval, the property was placed under a permanent Open Space Easement with the Sonoma County Agricultural and Open Space District which rescinded and replaced the existing Land Conservation Contract. However, the 2.5 acre portion of Lot 8 (aka Lot 2) was placed under a separate Open Space Easement held by the County of Sonoma in anticipation of the Lot Line Adjustment request. The Lot Line Adjustment was placed on hold until the Final Map recorded, which was done on October 3, 2014 (Book 766 of Maps, Page 23-34).

Project Description, Location, and Zoning: This is a request for a Lot Line Adjustment between two parcels of 27.40 acres (Lot 1) and 42.99 acres (Lot 2) resulting in two parcels of 29.90 acres (Lot 1) and 40.49 acres (Lot 2). The property owner of Lot 1 had planted the vineyard on a portion of the adjacent parcel by mistake. The Lot Line Adjustment would transfer ownership of the 2.5 acres of land and fulfill a purchase agreement that has been in effect on the 2.5 acres since 1999. Because Lot 1 is subject to an existing prime (Type I) Land Conservation Act Contract (1-303; 06-161443), the Lot Line Adjustment must be approved by the Board of Supervisors. Lot 1 contains approximately 17.5 acres of vineyard with one residence. Lot 2 contains approximately 10.5 acres of vineyard and is undeveloped. The parcels are located in Geyserville near the Highway 128 intersection with Geysers Road and Wilson Road. Lot 1 is zoned LIA (Land Intensive Agriculture) 20-acre density with an overlay zoning designation of Z (Second Unit Exclusion). Lot 2 is zoned LIA (Land Intensive Agriculture) 40-acre density with an overlay zoning designation of Z (Second Unit Exclusion), however, a rezoning is pending to place a B7 (Frozen Lot Size) rezoning as required as a condition of the Major Subdivision.

Land Conservation Act: To facilitate a Lot Line Adjustment, Government Code Section 51257 permits the contracting parties to rescind the existing contracts and simultaneously enter into new contracts if the required findings can be made. Staff has determined the Lot Line Adjustment can meet the required findings as described in the Resolution (refer to Attachment A).

Conditions of Approval: Lot 1 will continue to be devoted to a qualifying agricultural use as a commercial vineyard. Conditions of Approval require that prior to recording the Grant Deed for the Lot Line Adjustment, the property owner of Lot 1 shall submit the appropriate applications and filing fees to rescind and replace the existing contract with a new prime (Type I) Land Conservation contract, and an amendment of the General Plan and rezoning from the 40 acres per dwelling unit to the 20 acres per dwelling unit designation on the 2.5 acres of land adjusted in order to eliminate the split density designations.

Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends the Board find that all Government Code Section 51257 findings are satisfied in connection with the proposed Lot Line Adjustment, and approve the proposed Lot Line Adjustment subject to the attached Conditions of Approval.

Prior Board Actions:

Strategic Plan Alignment Goal 2: Economic and Environmental Stewardship

The Board of Supervisors has endorsed the continuation of the County's agricultural preserve program to preserve a maximum amount of the limited supply of agricultural, open space, scenic, and critical habitat lands within the county, to discourage premature and unnecessary conversion of such lands to urban land uses, to promote vitality in the agricultural economy, and to ensure an adequate, varied, and healthy supply of food and fiber for current and future generations. The purpose of the Lot Line Adjustment is to transfer 2.5 acres of vineyard between property owners and fulfill a long-term purchase agreement for this land. In addition, the rescission and replacement of Land Conservation Contract for Lot 1 will facilitate further agricultural investment and support agricultural viability and help preserve open space land in Sonoma County.

Whereas, to facilitate a Lot Line Adjustment, Government Code Section 51257, authorizes parties to a Land Conservation Contract or Contracts to mutually rescind the Contract or Contracts and simultaneously enter into a new Contract or Contracts;

Whereas, on December 13, 2011, the Board of Supervisors adopted the updated Sonoma County Uniform Rules for Agricultural Preserves and Farmland Security Zones (Uniform Rules) (Resolution No. 11-0678); and

Whereas, in accordance with the provisions of law, the Board of Supervisors held a public hearing on September 1, 2015 at which time all interested persons were given an opportunity to be heard; and

Whereas, the purpose of the Lot Line Adjustment is to transfer 2.5 acres of vineyard land from Lot 2 to Lot 1. Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Board of Supervisors makes the following findings consistent with Government Code Section 51257:

- a. The new contract would enforce and restrict the adjusted boundaries of the parcel for an initial term for at least as long as the unexpired term of the rescinded contract but for not less than 10 years. A condition of approval for the Lot Line Adjustment requires the rescission and replacement of the existing contract with a new prime (Type I) contract on Lot 1. The new contract for resulting Lot 1 will remain for not less than 10 years, renewing automatically every January 1st. The rescission and replacement of the existing contract with a new contract will require a separate and subsequent Board action to be scheduled at a later date;
- b. There is no net decrease in the amount of the acreage restricted by a contract because the Lot Line Adjustment increases the land under contract (Lot 1) by 2.5 acres increasing the parcel to 29.90 acres in size;
- c. The Lot Line Adjustment results in 100 percent (100%) of the land under the original contract to remain restricted under the replacement Prime (Type I) contract as required as a Condition of Approval for the Lot Line Adjustment;
- d. After the Lot Line Adjustment, the parcel (Lot 1) under contract will be 29.90 acres in size and remain large enough to sustain its agricultural use as a commercial vineyard with 20 acres planted. Resultant Lot 1 will exceed the 10-acre minimum acreage requirement for a prime contract, will exceed the minimum gross income requirement of \$1,000 per acre gross income for vineyard land, and will be devoted to agriculture with 67% of the parcel used for agricultural production. The single family residence on the parcel is a use found compatible with the agricultural use;
- e. The Lot Line Adjustment does not compromise the long-term agricultural productivity of the parcels subject to contract. The purpose of the Lot Line Adjustment is to transfer 2.5 acres of vineyard from Lot 2 to Lot 1, to the property owner who planted and maintains the vineyard;
- f. The Lot Line Adjustment is not likely to result in the removal of adjacent land from agricultural use. The land use and zoning designations on both parcels will remain unchanged as Land Intensive Agriculture 20-acres and 40-acres per dwelling unit. The parcels will have the same subdivision potential before and after the Lot Line Adjustment. The Lot Line Adjustment is minor in nature and will not result in the removal of adjacent land from agricultural use;
- g. The Lot Line Adjustment does not result in a greater number of developable parcels than existed prior to the adjustment, or an adjusted lot that is inconsistent with the General Plan. Under their current General Plan land use designation, Lot 1 is designated Land Intensive Agriculture 20 acres per dwelling unit and Lot 2 is designated Land Intensive Agriculture 40 acres per dwelling unit. Lot 1 and Lot 2 do not have subdivision potential either before or after the Lot Line Adjustment; and

Conditions of Approval require that prior to recording the Grant Deed for the Lot Line Adjustment, the property owners of Lot 1 shall submit the appropriate applications and filing fees to rescind and replace the existing contract with a new prime (Type I) Land Conservation contract. In addition, Lot 1 and Lot 2 are under the same land use designation of Land Intensive Agriculture, but, under two different density designations of 20 acres per dwelling unit and 40 acres per dwelling unit, respectively. Therefore, Conditions of Approval of the Lot Line Adjustment requires the property owner of Lot 1 to file on the 2.5 acre portion of land an amendment of the General Plan and rezoning from the 40 acres per dwelling unit to the 20 acres per dwelling unit designation in order to eliminate the split density designations, prior to recording the Grant Deed.

Be It Further Resolved that the Board of Supervisors hereby finds that substantial evidence in the record before it supports the above findings, and further finds that the Lot Line Adjustment meets the requirements of the above findings.

Be It Further Resolved that the Board of Supervisors finds the requested action described in this Resolution is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Section 15305 Class 5 of Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations (CEQA Guidelines) in that the project is a minor Lot Line Adjustment.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Board of Supervisors hereby grants the request by Browne and Hall Ranch for the requested Minor Lot Line Adjustment subject to the Conditions of Approval in Attachment "A," attached hereto which includes a condition to rescind and replace the existing prime (Type I) Land Conservation Contract on Lot 1 and to require an amendment of the General Plan and rezoning from the 40 acres per dwelling unit to the 20 acres per dwelling unit designation on the 2.5 acres adjusted between parcels to eliminate the split density designations, prior to recording the Grant Deed.

The following note shall be placed on the deed or deeds: "The purpose of this deed is for a Lot Line Adjustment for the combination of a portion of the Lands of Hall T-T, LLC, as described by deed recorded under Document No. 2012-095242, Sonoma County Records, APN 131-250-008, with the Lands of Timothy Otis Browne and Denyse Parsons Browne, as described by deed recorded under Document No. 2005-019738, Sonoma County Records, APN 131-030-027. This deed is pursuant to an application for a Lot Line Adjustment (LLA10-0006) on file in the office of the Sonoma County Permit and Resource Management Department. It is the express intent of the signators hereto that the recordation of this deed extinguishes any underlying parcels or portions of parcels." It is the responsibility of the surveyor/engineer preparing the deeds to insure that the information contained within the combination note is correct. Note: The County Surveyor may modify the above described note.
- 3. Deed of Trust agreements, which encumber only portions of accepted legal lots, are violations of the Subdivision Map Act; therefore, prior to Permit and Resource Management Department approval of the deed for recordation, the applicant shall submit either recorded documents or documents to be recorded concurrently with the Lot Line Adjustment deeds, showing that any Deed of Trust agreements on the subject properties will conform with the adjusted lot boundaries.
- 4. After approval of the deed description by the County Surveyor, a grant deed or deeds shall be prepared and submitted to the Permit and Resource Management Department for approval prior to recording.
- 5. The property owner(s) shall execute a Right-to-Farm Declaration on a form provided by PRMD to be submitted before the Lot Line Adjustment is cleared by PRMD for recordation. The Right-to-Farm Declaration shall be recorded concurrently with the PRMD approved lot line adjustment grant deed(s) to reflect the newly configured parcels.

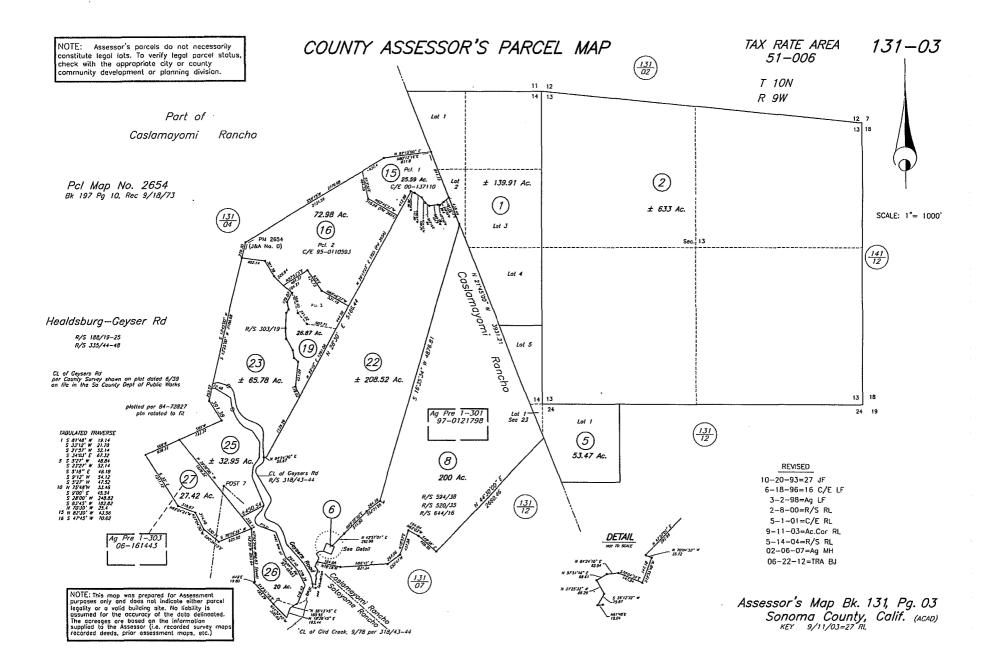
- 6. A site plan map of the Lot Line Adjustment shall be prepared by a licensed surveyor or civil engineer and attached to the deed(s) to be recorded. Any errors or omissions on this exhibit shall not affect the deed description."
- 7. 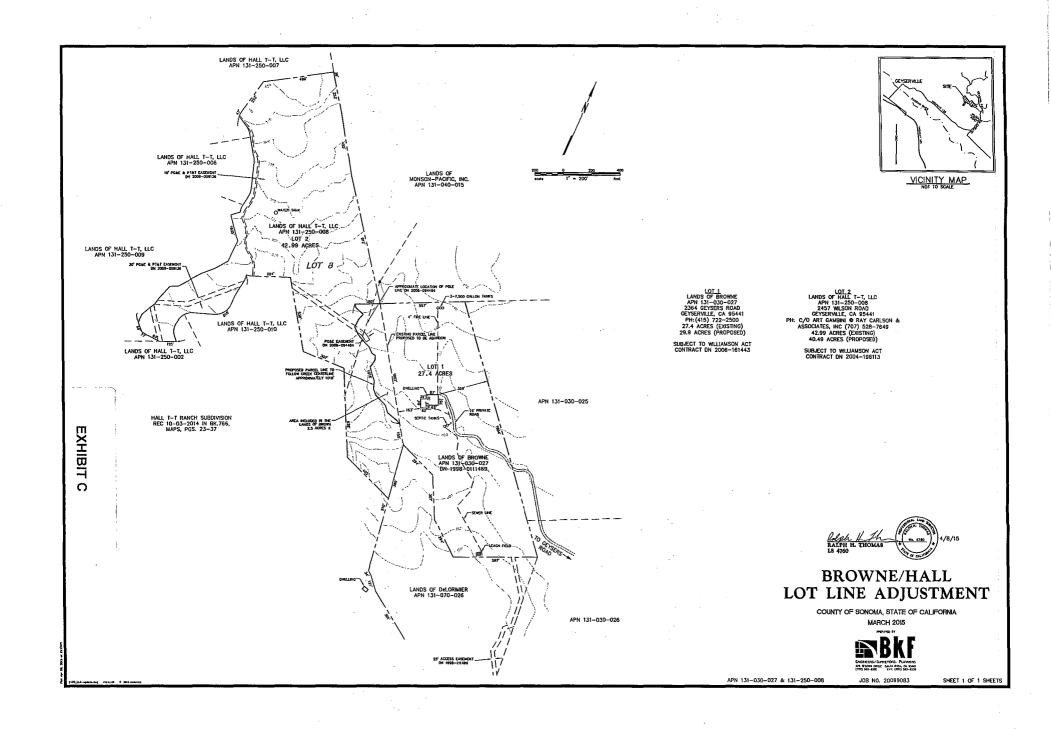


PROPOSAL STATEMENT

Title: IVRS Professional Services Contract with Selectron Technologies, Inc.

Recommended Actions:

Authorize the Director of the Permit and Resource Management Department to execute an agreement for \$34,675 with Selectron Technologies, Inc. effective through March 31, 2016, to migrate and update the existing Automated Permit Scheduling solution and provide the related interface for the Accela Automation permitting system upgrade.

Executive Summary:

For the past 17 years, PRMD has partnered with Selectron Technologies, the industry leader in Interactive Voice Response Systems. Selectron Technologies provided the Automated Permit Scheduling system that is housed, on site, at PRMD. This system allows citizens to call in, 24 hours a day, to schedule an inspection for the following business day.

Selectron's VoicePermits application software currently resides on a server that has reached its end of life, requiring replacement of the equipment and an upgrade of the software. PRMD has another virtual server, eliminating the need for additional hardware acquisitions. This contract will provide the software upgrade on the current server and the migration to the existing virtual server. The cost for professional services related to the software upgrade and migration would amount to \$14,675.

In addition, as part of PRMD's project to implement the Accela Automation permitting system upgrade, Selectron is responsible for providing one-time programming services to develop the interface between the Automated Permit Scheduling system and Accela Automation. The cost for these professional services related to that interface would amount to \$20,000. Pursuant to the Scope of Work, all work performed under this contract will be completed within 154 days of contract execution.

Adopt a resolution issuing a roiling permit (Ordinance No. 3836R) and necessary permit extensions to North Coast Engineering for the Flucke Russian River Stream Bank Restoration Project along the bank of the Russian River below a private residence located at 17734 Orchard Avenue in the town of Guerneville.

Executive Summary:

The objectives of the Flucke Russian River Stream Bank Restoration Project (ROI15-0008) are to maintain and enhance natural habitat and improve water quality. This will be accomplished by the combination of repairing the existing rip-rap erosion protection mat and installation of live willow Coir Lifts.

Section VIII of Ordinance No. 3836R requires that an application for a permit be filed with the Board of Supervisors prior to the performance of certain prescribed work or operations in a river, stream or channel which may decrease the clarity of these waterways.

Concurrent Resolution No. 88-1220 of the Board of Supervisors requires that applications for permits describe the work or operations to be done, the purpose of the work or operations, the manner in which the work or operations will be carried out, and the time within which the work or operations will be completed. Pursuant to the Resolution, applications must be accompanied by a copy of the agreement required by Section 1601 et seq. of the California Fish and Wildlife Code and water discharge permits applicable to the work or operations, if any, pursuant to the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act.

The application submitted by North Coast Engineering complies with the requirements of the 3836R Ordinance. The applicant represents that no significant residual impacts affecting water clarity of the Russian River will result. The applicant proposes to restore and protect approximately forty-five linear feet of stream bank along the east side of the Russian River. The construction will repair and replace the existing erosion resistant rip-rap mat to provide support and a competent foundation for the construction of the Coir Lifts. The work also consists of placing repetitive layers of live willow cuttings

and hybridized Coir Lifts to construct a restored vegetated embankment. The work is proposed to commence no earlier than September 2, 2015 and is scheduled to be completed by October 15, 2015.

A 3836R permit lasts for a duration of 30 days. The work may require greater than 30 days to complete. To accomplish this, the permit may be extended for additional 30-day periods if such permit period extensions are approved by the Board of Supervisors as requested in this agenda item. The Director of PRMD shall confirm the need for each permit extension immediately prior to the expiration of the current permit period to ensure that the work is not yet completed and an additional 30-day period extension is necessary.

The 3836R permit requires a 4/5 approval vote by the Board according to the requirements of the 1988 ballot measure creating the 3836R Ordinance.

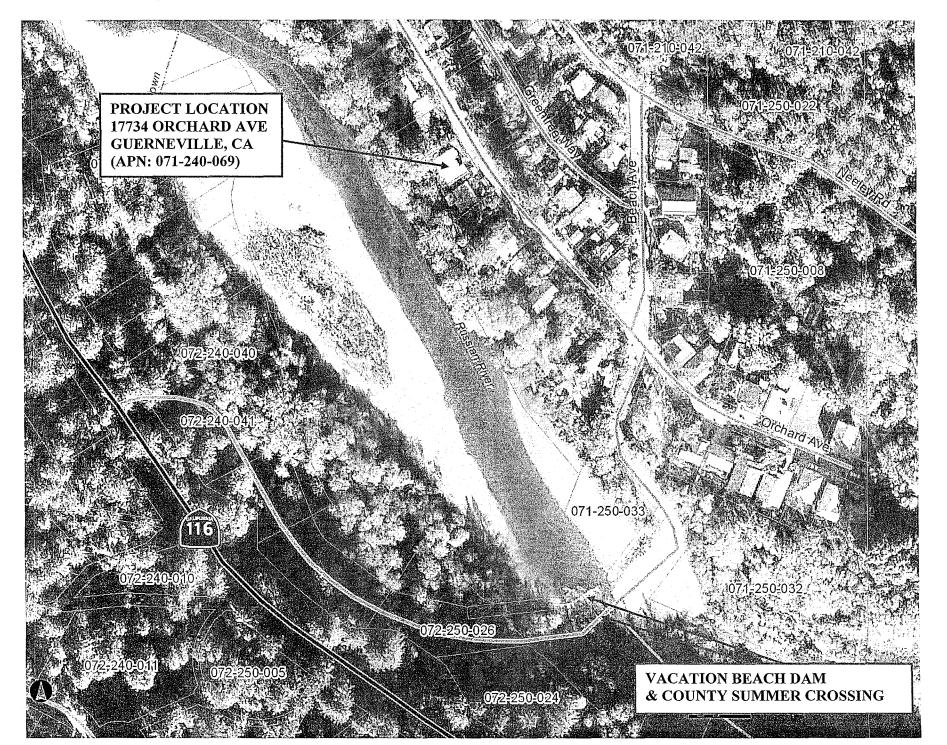

Title: CalRecycle Illegal Disposal Site Abatement Grant Application

Recommended Actions:

Authorize the Permit and Resource Management Department (PRMD) to seek \$65,910.00 in CalRecycle grant monies to remedy illegal conditions at 4135 Bodega Avenue, Petaluma, California; Approve required resolution to support the grant application and to appoint PRMD Director Tennis Wick to conduct all negotiations, execute and submit all documents necessary for the completion of the project, subject to approval of the Board of Supervisors.

Executive Summary:

This item is to authorize the Permit and Resource Management Department (PRMD) to seek a \$65,910 grant from CalRecycle to clean up a Petaluma property that is in violation of the County Code and to approve a required resolution in support of the grant application.

Sonoma County residents have long complained about the unsafe and unsanitary conditions at 4135 Bodega Avenue in Petaluma, California. Beginning in 1998, County residents complained to the Code Enforcement Division of PRMD about their strong objections to the use of the property for a junkyard, equipment terminal, motor vehicle storage yard and an occupied motor home. Since that time, PRMD, County Counsel, and, most recently, the District Attorney, have brought administrative, civil, and criminal actions against the property owner to bring the property into compliance with Sonoma County and Fish and Wildlife Code. These civil and criminal enforcement actions have failed to cure the problem, because the owner is both unable and unwilling to take necessary action. A recent inspection of the property revealed evidence of continued junkyard conditions, human waste, uncontained sewage, and squatters living in the RVs or in tents on the property. A Judgment that was issued against the owner allows for the County, working with the owner, to enter the property and restore it to a conforming use for its zoning. This grant will allow the County to remove trash; remove and recycle almost 100 junked vehicles, RVs, and boats; and to remove a man-made illegal dam impeding water and fish flow in a Wilson Creek tributary.

Even with a recent infusion of additional funding to support Code Enforcement efforts, given the scope and size of this project, those funds are insufficient to clean up and abate this property without draining the fund almost completely.

The grant will not result in any debt to the State and does not require matching funds. The County does, however, agree to continue to pursue cost recovery for funds expended on the cleanup of this property, including placing a lien on the property, and to assist in and support any CalRecycle efforts to recover costs.

Prior Board Actions:

On May 5, 2015, the Board authorized additional County funds to PRMD's Code Enforcement Department to address dilapidated and nonconforming properties.

Strategic Plan Alignment Goal 1: Safe, Healthy, and Caring Community

The CalRecycle grant program aligns with the County's Strategic Plan by recognizing that properties on which illegal dumping occurs lose economic value; create public health and safety and environmental problems; and degrade the enjoyment and pride in the affected communities. The proposed action also supports the County's goal of economic stewardship as abandoned, idled, or underutilized properties due to unauthorized dumping negatively impact what were once the sources of economic benefits to a community.

Sonoma County residents have long complained about the unsafe and unsanitary conditions at 4135 Bodega Avenue in Petaluma, California. Beginning in 1998, County residents complained to the Code Enforcement Division of the Permit & Resource Management Division (PRMD) about their strong objections to the use of the property for a junkyard, equipment terminal, motor vehicle storage yard and an occupied motor home. After a 1998 Notice of Violation was sent to the property owner (then the Rose Goulart Trust), the County and the property owner began a series of meetings and inspections to bring the property into compliance. Documents related to earlier efforts to administratively abate the nuisance are included here as Attachment A. However, the owner failed to comply. Residents continued to complain, and the County continued to take action against the new property owner, including two new Notices of Violation in 2008 and 2009, an Administrative Complaint and Abatement Hearing (resulting in a decision finding violations of Sonoma County Code), injunctive relief proceedings in Superior Court (resulting in a Default Judgment against the property owner), and the property owner's unsuccessful appeal. Documents related to those efforts are included here as Attachment B. A recent inspection of the property revealed evidence of continued junkyard conditions, human waste, uncontained sewage, and squatters living in the RVs or in tents on the property.

Additionally, in early 2015 the District Attorney filed a criminal complaint against Mr. Goulart for violations of Fish & Game and Penal Codes. That complaint is included here as Attachment C.

These civil and criminal enforcement actions have failed to cure the problem, because the owner is both unable and unwilling to take necessary action. During the pendency of these administrative, civil and criminal actions, the situation has worsened, as evidenced by the chronological photographic documentation of the property's state. Photos from 2009, 2011, and 2012, and 2014, all show the deterioration of the property and Wilson Creek and the increased risks to public health and safety if action is not taken. Photos of the site over time are included here as Attachment D.

SUBSTANTIATION OF NEED FOR GRANT FUNDS (20 points)

Substantiate unwillingness to pay by documenting refusal of the owner/responsible party to comply with lawful enforcement orders. Substantiate that the owner/responsible party cannot be identified or located by attaching records searches and other actions taken leading to that conclusion. This information is required for each site proposed for cleanup. List the availability of other appropriate federal or state enforcement and/or cleanup programs to remediate the site.

The applicant must agree to pursue cost recovery for funds expended on private properties to the extent possible, unless waived by CalRecycle. The applicant must repay CalRecycle any funds collected through cost recovery, sale of liened properties, special tax assessments, or other methods of collection, less any reasonable administrative costs incurred by the applicant in obtaining repayment. Applicants cleaning up public property for the public benefit where no responsible party can be identified may request a waiver of cost recovery. Applicants not requesting a waiver must address cost recovery, either through their own mechanisms on behalf of CalRecycle, or by assisting CalRecycle in pursuing cost recovery through its own statutorily authorized mechanisms. Information presented in this section is subject to the review, verification, and approval of CalRecycle's Legal Office.

George Goulart, the property owner, has been the subject of Sonoma County enforcement efforts to ensure his compliance with his basic legal responsibilities since 2008. Despite myriad efforts to bring Mr. Goulart's property into compliance with Sonoma County Code requirements, Mr. Goulart has failed completely to achieve even minimum compliance. A summary of County correspondence with Mr. Goulart evidencing his failure to respond or comply is included here as Attachment E. Mr. Goulart is unable to pay the significant amount of money that it would take to clean up the property. A historical summary of the liens on Mr. Goulart's property and a recent Zillow value estimate is included here as Attachment F. Mr. Goulart has both a history of criminal and civil prosecution for these violations; a civil contempt action (which would subject Mr. Goulart to criminal penalty, including jail time) would not further the property's remediation. Mr. Goulart testified at his 2008 abatement hearing that he was unable to pay any judgment; indeed, his testimony evidences his inability to comprehend the severity of the problem or how to remedy it. The transcript of the hearing is included here as Attachment G (with relevant testimony on page 37). Any sale of the property would ensure that a lien to recover clean up and abatement costs is satisfied in full.

Sonoma County's Code Enforcement Section receives and investigates between 800-1000 new complaints a year, and has a system to ensure that a complaint which impacts public health and safety is prioritized. In May, 2015, the Board of Supervisors authorized funds to increase resources to address those properties where clean-up and abatement will not happen without direct County intervention. However, given the scope and size of this project, the County's funds are insufficient to clean up and abate this property without draining the funds available for Code Enforcement abatement. Those costs which are not eligible under the grant program will be covered by the County.

The County agrees to continue to pursue cost recovery for funds expended on the clean up of this property, and to assist in and support any CalRecycle efforts to recover costs.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES (5 points)

Clean up of this property will also allow for removal of neighborhood blight, ensure protection of the environment, and provides a solution to bring this property into compliance where other methods have been ineffective. Additionally, given the number of vehicles and the amount of junk metal, the County will work with our contractor to ensure that this project is a model for clean up and abatement that includes a focus on principles of reuse and recycle.

Given the significant impacts to Wilson Creek that the property's illegal dumping and squatter conditions have caused, immediate action will also impede any future squatters and continuation of pollution. With the RVs removed and the property cleared, enforcement efforts to prevent squatters and corresponding sewage problems will be much more effective. The owner has expressed a desire to clear the property, but lacks the resources and ability to undertake such action on his own.

Recent Sonoma County Code Enforcement efforts have implemented a new holistic approach to abatement in hoarding situations, including provision of wrap-around service provision from Health and Human Services Departments, to protect against recidivism. The County will implement such work in this project, as it has been successful.

Procedures/Tasks

Under the general direction of Code Enforcement Staff, an approved subcontractor will remove from the property and properly recycle (if possible) the following:

Eligible Major Work Items-

- A. Junkyard conditions- Currently, the property contains an estimated 300 cubic yards of debris consisting of:
 - Scrap lumber- A partially collapsed wooden structure and other scrap lumber will be isolated from other materials and removed from the property.
 - Metal- Miscellaneous non-operative farm equipment, vehicle parts, bicycles, tire rims, buckets, fencing, and storage racks will be isolated from other materials and removed from the property.
 - Garbage/trash- Household garbage and trash that is scattered throughout the property and contained within several vehicles will be separated from other materials and removed from the property.
 - Special scrap metal- Several utility trailers/trailer frames will be removed from the property.
- B. Tires- An estimated 200+/- vehicle tires will be isolated from other debris, removed from the property and transported to a tire disposal company.
- C. Boats/junked boats- Approximately 15-20 non-functional boats will be removed from the property. Fiberglass ones will be dismantled, metal ones will be recycled,
- D. Large vehicles and equipment- 5 large dump trucks will be emptied of trash/debris and removed from the property using a heavy equipment tow truck.
- E. Travel trailers/recreational vehicles- non-functional travel trailers/recreational vehicles will be emptied of trash/debris and removed from the property.
- F. Box Trailers-Three 50' box trailers will be emptied of any trash/debris and towed from the property using special equipment as needed.
- G. Non-commercial vehicles- approximately 30 non-operative motor vehicles will be removed from the property and recycled.
- H. Special hazards- approximately twelve 55 gallon barrels (contents unknown) will be removed from the property. Barrels containing liquids will have the contents transferred into new, properly labeled barrels and removed from the property.
- I. Special hazards- a man-made wooden dam constructed across a creek tributary and other debris along the creek channel will be removed from the property.

Appropriate personal protective equipment and site safety procedures will be followed during the loading and removal of the above. Appropriate disposal techniques and procedures will be used to ensure the safety of the workers and the surrounding environment. No permits will be required for this work.

Ineligible Work Tasks

There are no ineligible work tasks included in this Work Plan.

BUDGET

<u>Eligible project costs</u>- It is estimated that the completion of the Work Plan will require a contractor to use approximately 960 worker hours to complete through the use of special equipment and expertise. The budget for the contractor for this project is \$65,910.00, and their detailed breakdown of the work is included in this Application as an attachment titled "Estimate."

The cost of vehicle removal is offset by concurrent use of available Sonoma County Abandoned Vehicle Abatement Service Authority funds in an amount not to exceed \$26,260.00. See attached letter from the Service Authority regarding its commitment to the project.

<u>Ineligible project costs-</u> It is anticipated that the County of Sonoma will incur indirect costs in staff time by the following:

Title: Taylor Mountain Recreational Trails Program grant

Recommended Actions:

Approve a resolution to apply for \$1.7 million in grant funds from the Recreational Trails Program to construct eight miles of new trails at Taylor Mountain Regional Park and Open Space Preserve and authorizing the Regional Parks Director to execute and submit agreements and other documents as necessary for completion of the project.

Executive Summary:

Regional Parks is seeking funding to construct an estimated eight miles of new trails in Taylor Mountain Regional Park and Open Space Preserve. This would provide new public access to nearly half of the 1,100-acre park.

In July, State Parks announced \$11 million is available statewide for non-motorized trail grants through the Recreational Trails Program. This amount is significantly more than the \$2 million usually offered for this competitive grant program, and grant requests from \$100,000 to \$4 million are encouraged. A minimum of 12% matching funds is required. Based on local match available and the next priority trail projects, Regional Parks recommends requesting a \$1.7 million Recreational Trails Program grant and providing \$316,000 in local match, for a \$2 million project.

The \$316,000 in local match is available, based on cash match and value of volunteer labor for trail construction projects. The cash match totals \$132,000 and includes \$80,000 from Sonoma County Regional Parks Foundation, \$25,000 Major Maintenance funds designated for Taylor road repair/trail conversion, \$20,000 in Santa Rosa Area 4 Park Mitigation Fees, and \$7,000 from Sonoma County Trails Council. The in-kind match valued as \$184,000 includes value of Regional Parks' labor and equipment, materials donated by Sonoma County Regional Parks Foundation, volunteer trail construction, and volunteer support.

This work is identified as Phase 2 for Taylor Mountain Park and Preserve development. Phase 1

construction is underway, including access from Petaluma Hill Road, staging area, and natural play area, and trail connections to approximately 375 acres of the park and preserve. There are over 5 miles of open trails. Many of the current trails are pedestrian only, constraining other types of trail use to a few sections of trail.

Phase 2 will construct approximately 8 miles of multiple-use trail identified in the Taylor Mountain Regional Park and Preserve Master Plan. Combined with Phase 1 work, this will open access to 75% of the park and preserve. The new Colgan Creek and Cooper Ridge trails will connect Kawana Springs Resort (and future camping area), Kawana Springs trailhead, Linwood trailhead, and the Barn Area (future educational facility).

Future park development approved with the Taylor Mountain park and preserve Master Plan will include additional trails, campsites, picnic areas, and a visitor center.

Grant applications are due September 15 and require a local resolution to apply for this funding along with designating a local representative to administer the grant. This representative's administration includes signing the grant application form and assuring that CEQA compliance has been obtained. If recommended for funding, the representative's administration includes assuring NEPA and Historic Preservation Act compliance. If awarded grant funding, the representative signs the grant agreement, grant project status reports, requests grant amendments pertaining to time or grant project scope, and requests reimbursement. The Director of Regional Parks is the recommended representative.

This competitive grant could be awarded Fall 2016. If funding is received, Regional Parks would return to the Board to award the bid for trail construction, which would occur late 2016 – 2018. Regional Parks will return to the Board at a later date with a proposal for funding the ongoing operations and management of the proposed Taylor Mountain Phase 2 improvements.

March 17, 2015, Board received the County of Sonoma Capital Project Plan 2015 – 2020, including subject Taylor Mountain Phase 2. September 30, 2014, Board awarded the bid for the construction of Taylor Mountain Phase 1 Petaluma Hill Road Trailhead. July 29, 2014 the Board authorized Regional Parks' Director to enter into an agreement with Sonoma County Trails Council to construct trails at Taylor Mountain. July 29, 2014 by Reso. No. 14-0308 Approved the labor Compliance Program for the project. February 5, 2013 by Reso. No. 13-0040, the Board approved transfer of the Taylor Mountain Property from the District to the County. October 9, 2012 by Reso. No. 12-0481, the Board approved the Taylor Mountain Regional Park and Open Space Preserve Master Plan and Mitigated Negative Declaration. June 21, 2011 by Reso. No. 11-0348, the Board approved application for Statewide Park Program Grant. October 20, 2009 by Reso. No. 09-0985, the Board approved the Interim Public Access Permit Program and by Board Reso. No. 09-0986, the Board directed the District and Regional Parks to execute a park management and planning agreement. October 11, 2005 by Reso. No. 05-0915, the Board approved the fee title acquisition of the Taylor Mountain property.

Executive Summary:

California Penal Code Section 4025 (c) requires that this itemized annual report of the activity of the Inmate Welfare Trust Fund be submitted to the Board of Supervisors for review. Accordingly, the Fiscal Year 2014-2015 Annual Inmate Welfare Report is attached for the Board's information and review.

The California Penal Code allows the Sheriff to authorize expenditures from this Trust Fund for items or programs primarily for the benefit, education, and welfare of the inmates confined within the Sonoma County detention facilities. Any funds that are not needed for the benefit, welfare, and/or education of the inmates may be expended by the Sheriff for the maintenance of jail facilities or for other programs as deemed appropriate by the Sheriff. Inmate Welfare funds must be expended in accordance with the California Penal Code, Section 4025(e).

The Sheriff is also authorized to operate a jail store, known as the Inmate Commissary, to sell goods to inmates. The Inmate Commissary is operated through the Jail Stores Trust Fund. Sale prices are determined by the Sheriff and all profits from the operation of the jail stores are deposited in the Inmate Welfare Trust Fund to be kept in the Treasury of the County. Expenditures from the Jail Stores Trust are primarily for the purchase of goods sold (inventory) to inmates through the commissary. The profit generated from these sales is transferred to the Inmate Welfare Trust and combined with other revenues to fund various inmate programs such as: Starting Point for \$215,080 (an inmate alcohol and drug treatment program), Friends Outside \$16,917 (a non-profit agency providing support to inmates and their families), several educational classes \$34,137, and GED classes \$72,200.

FY 14-15 Financial Summary

The FY 14-15 Annual Inmate Welfare Report reflects a prior year fund balance of \$92,123 for the Jail Stores Trust (JST). The FY 14-15 revenues for the JST were \$1,402,753 and expenditures were \$1,434,431 for a FY14-15 net loss to the JST of \$31,678 as a result of over estimating the year-end residual profit operating transfer. This resulted in a JST ending fund balance of \$60,445 for FY 14-15 instead of the targeted \$70,138, which is 5% of annual revenues. The JST ending fund balance for FY 13-14, FY 14-15, and projected balance for FY 15-16 are also shown in the table below.

Revenues for the Inmate Welfare Trust were \$ 881,493. Operating expenditures totaled \$616,795 for a net gain of \$264,698. The balance in the Inmate Welfare Trust Fund for fiscal years FY 13-14, FY 14-15, and projected balance for FY 15-16 are also shown in the table below. The IWT fund balance is reserved for unexpected shortfalls in revenues or to pay for unanticipated expenditures. Over the course of the existence of the IWT and JST funds, there have been periods when the funds have failed to generate profit. Therefore, a fund balance is maintained to cover any such shortages.

Revenues from inmate phone commissions decreased by \$12,148 or 8% as a result of a Federal Communications Commission (FCC) ruling that took effect February 11, 2014. This ruling reduces inmate phone commission revenues earned from the inmates' interstate phone calls.

The Sheriff's Office is continually monitoring the inmate phone commission revenues to assess the full impacts of this change and any potential future changes. There is an expected subsequent FCC ruling to be announced September 2015 that may further reduce phone commission revenues.

Fiscal Year 2014-2015 Annual Inmate Welfare Trust Fund Report

The purpose of this report is to meet the requirement outlined in the California Penal Code, Section 4025 (e), which requires that an itemized report of trust fund revenues and expenditures be submitted annually to the Board of Supervisors.

There are two separate trust funds used in the inmate welfare accounting system. They are the Jail Stores Trust Fund and the Inmate Welfare Trust Fund. The Jail Stores Trust Fund was established for use as an operating fund for the Inmate Commissary. The Inmate Welfare Trust Fund holds money to be spent by the Sheriff, primarily for the benefit, education and welfare of inmates confined within the jail. Any funds that are not needed for the welfare of the inmates may be spent for the maintenance of county jail facilities or as otherwise deemed appropriate by the Sheriff.

Jail Stores Trust Fund

Revenues generated to this fund come from commissary sales, inmate vending machine sales, aluminum can recycling, and prior year revenue. Expenditures fall into five categories: Salary/Benefits, merchandise expenses, operating expenses, operational transfers to the Inmate Welfare Trust, and tax payments. Profit generated from the operation of the commissary is a significant source of revenue for the Inmate Welfare Trust.

Attachment "A" is a detailed summary of the revenues and expenditures for FY 14-15.

Inmate Welfare Trust Fund

The Inmate Welfare Trust Fund is managed through the Inmate Welfare Trust Committee. The Sheriff or his designee has final authority over all Inmate Welfare Trust Fund activities. Revenues received in this fund are derived from the following sources: interest generated from the fund balances of both trust funds, vending machine commissions, inmate telephone commissions, miscellaneous revenues, and transfer from the Jail Stores Trust (profit from various sources).

Expenditures from the Inmate Welfare Trust Fund meet the guidelines outlined in the Penal Code, Section 4025 (e), which states: "The money and property deposited in the inmate welfare trust fund shall be expended by the Sheriff primarily for the benefit, education, and welfare of the inmates confined within the jail. Any funds that are not needed for the welfare of the inmates may be expended for the

maintenance of county jail facilities. Maintenance of county jail facilities may include, but is not limited to, the salary and benefit of personnel used in programs to benefit the inmates, including but not limited to, education, drug and alcohol treatment, welfare, library, accounting, and other programs deemed appropriate by the Sheriff"

Authorize the Sheriff to execute Amendment No. 2 to Agreement with Sirron Software Corporation for Automated Civil Case Management Services, to extend the termination date of the Agreement from September 11, 2015 until March 9, 2016, for an additional cost of \$7,544, for a new contract total of \$74,236.

Executive Summary:

The Sheriff's Office is requesting authorization to execute an Amendment No. 2 to Agreement for Civil Case Management Services, with Sirron Software Corporation, at a total cost of \$7,544.

<u>Background</u>. The Sheriff's Office Civil Bureau processes orders or instructions issued by a Civil Court, and has relied upon an automated case management system to manage day-to-day operations since the early 1990s. All Civil processes are conducted and carried out according to the California Code of Civil Procedure (CCP). Automated case management systems allow Civil Bureau staff to process timesensitive court paperwork efficiently and accurately. Additionally some Civil Bureau processes include the collection of fees and issuance of payments, requiring some accounting functionality.

As a result of a Request for Proposals (RFP) in October of 2009, your Board approved an Agreement for Automated Civil Case Management Services with Sirron Software Corp. on March 16, 2010 for a term of three years. An Amendment to extend the original Agreement for an additional two years was approved on March 12, 2013. The current Agreement with Sirron is due to expire on September 11, 2015.

In December 2014, the Sheriff's Office issued a RFP to select a new provider of Civil Case Management Services software as the existing system was outdated and no longer being supported at a desired level. Tyler Technologies was selected as the new provider of software and related services, and a three year Agreement was approved by your Board on June 9, 2015. Implementation of the new software is currently in progress, with an estimated full transition to be completed by September 18, 2015.

Request. In order to prevent a lapse in automated Civil case management services and to allow for any unanticipated delays that might occur during the implementation of Tyler software, we are requesting to extend the term of the Agreement with Sirron Software Corp. for an additional six (6) months. The extension will allow for the maintenance and support of Sirron software until a full conversion to Tyler software is completed. Though the term of Amendment is for an additional six months, Sirron will only invoice for the months they actually provide system to the Sheriff's Office. Civil Case Management software is fully supported through Sheriff's IT staff however, we have been in contact with County ISD regarding the transition to a new Civil case management software.

Special Fund Appropriations. Government Code §26731 requires that eighteen dollars (\$18) of any fee collected by the Sheriff's Civil Bureau shall be deposited into a special fund in the County treasury. Ninety-five percent of moneys collected in this fund are to be expended by the Sheriff for the "implementation, maintenance, and purchase auxiliary equipment and furnishings for automated systems deemed necessary by the Sheriff's civil division". Therefore, all costs associated with the proposed Amendment will be offset by revenue from this special fund, with no impact on the County General Fund.

AMENDMENT NO. 2 TO AGREEMENT FOR AUTOMATED CIVIL CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICES

This Amendment No. 2 is entered into by and between the County of Sonoma, a political subdivision of the State of California (hereinafter, COUNTY) and Sirron Software Corporation, a corporation authorized to operate in California (hereinafter, "CONTRACTOR").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, COUNTY and CONTRACTOR entered into the Agreement for Automated Civil Case Management Services dated March 22, 2010, and later entered into Amendment No. 1 to Agreement for Automated Civil Case Management Services dated March 12, 2013 (collectively, the "Agreement");

WHEREAS*, COUNTY and CONTRACTOR have been mutually satisfied with the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the parties wish to amend the sections and subsections of the Agreement relating to Payment (Subsection 2.2), and Term (Section 3), which can be amended by the parties in writing pursuant to Section 8 of the Agreement.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows.

- 1. Subsection 2.2 of the Agreement, entitled "Maintenance and Support Costs," is hereby deleted and replaced in its entirety with the following:
 - Maintenance and Support Costs. For all ongoing maintenance and support costs pursuant to Article 1.1 (b), Contractor shall be paid as follows: \$12,735 shall be paid for the period of September 11, 2010 through September 10, 2011; \$12,990 shall be paid for the period of September 11, 2011 through September 10, 2012; \$13,250 shall be paid for the period of September 10, 2012 through September 9, 2013; \$13,250 shall be paid for the period of September 10, 2013 through September 9, 2014; \$13,250 shall be paid for the period of September 10, 2013 through September 9, 2014; \$13,250 shall be paid for the period of September 10, 2014 through September 11, 2015, and \$1,216.60 for each additional month of maintenance and support after September 11, 2015, not to exceed \$7,293.60 for up to six (6) additional months. Contractor may invoice County for such services on an annual basis no earlier than 30 days in advance of the start of such services.
- 2. Section 3 of the Agreement, entitled "Term of Agreement," is hereby deleted and replaced in its entirety with the following:

- 3. <u>Term of Agreement</u>. The term of this Agreement shall be from March 2, 2010 to March 9, 2016, unless terminated earlier in accordance with the provisions of <u>Article 4</u> below.
- 3. All other provisions of the Agreement are unchanged, and shall remain in full force and effect throughout the remaining balance of the term of the Agreement.

Reject all bids for the 2015 Pavement Preservation Program Bonded Wearing Course Project M15101

Executive Summary:

The Department of Transportation and Public Works (TPW) is requesting the Board to reject all bids for the 2015 Pavement Preservation Bonded Wearing Course Project M15101. As part of the 2-Year Pavement Preservation Program approved by the Board on March 17, 2015 representing a two-year local investment of \$22.4M in County roads, TPW staff prepared plans and specifications for a Bonded Wearing Course, a thin layer of asphalt that seals the existing pavement for preventative maintenance, to be applied to five roadways, Madrone Road, East Napa Street, Santa Rosa Avenue, Sebastopol Road and Bodega Avenue. The project was advertised for bid from July 2, 2015 thru August 2, 2015.

The Bids were opened on August 5, 2015 and resulted in one bidder:

Telfer Highway Technologies.....\$3,939,428.88

The Engineer's Estimate was \$3,285,680.00.

The low bid of \$3,939,428.88 is \$653,750.00 above the Engineer's Estimate. The major differences between the bid and the estimate are the costs for the asphalt items, concrete ramps and the traffic control items. Due to the significant difference between the bid and the estimate TPW staff is recommending that all bids be rejected at this time. As a result, the project will not move forward at this time and will need to be re-bid at a later date. The project was originally scheduled to be constructed in October and November of this year. The bidder has been notified in writing of Staff's recommendation to reject all bids.

Staff is completing a detailed bid analysis on why some of the bid items were high and what changes can be made to the project plans and specifications to achieve a lower cost. To lower the construction cost, staff is also looking at the possibility of revising the pavement treatment for Madrone Road and East Napa Street to a chip seal and adding these two roads to the chip seal program for 2016. The 2016 chip seal project will be in construction in the late summer of 2016. A chip seal is a layer of bituminous binder (liquid asphalt) followed by a layer of aggregate, used to seal the pavement for preventative maintenance purposes. The difference between a chip seal and a bonded wearing course is the pavement smoothness and cost. The chip seal treatment is less costly, and the bonded wearing course provides a slightly smoother surface. The longevity of a pavement treatment depends on the volume and speed of traffic and the existing structural section of the roadway. The labor of the chip seal process is performed by Transportation and Public works Department personnel. The volume and speed of the traffic and the existing structural section made this a feasible alternative for these two roads. For both Madrone Road and East Napa Street, a bonded wearing course and a chip seal are comparable pavement treatments, based on the existing condition of the roadways.

Staff recommends that the remaining three roads (Santa Rosa Avenue, Sebastopol Road and Bodega Avenue) be combined with the Bonded Wearing Course project for 2016. It is expected that by combining the projects, the larger scope will generate more competition. The staff intends to re-bid the project in early 2016, and this project is expected to be in construction in the summer and fall of 2016. Additionally, we will reach out to the Construction community to create greater interest in the Bonded Wearing Course project.

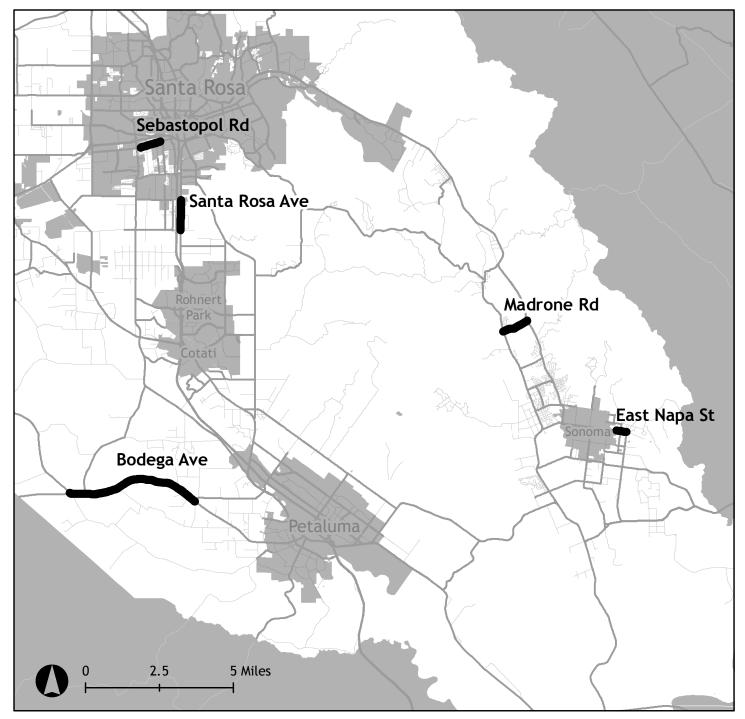

Executive Summary:

The Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality and Port Security Bond Act of 2006, approved by the voters as Proposition 1B, authorizes the State of California to issue general obligation bonds for specified purposes, including grants for transit system safety, security, and disaster response projects.

The California Government Code directs that one billion dollars be deposited in the Proposition 1B Transit System Safety, Security and Disaster Response Account. Annually, one hundred million dollars must be made available upon appropriation by the legislature to entities for eligible transit system safety, security, and disaster response projects. Sonoma County Transit's (SCT) share of these funds for FY 2015 through the California Transit Security Grant Program (CTSGP) is \$31,815.

The FY 2015 California Transit Security Grant Program is administered by the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (OES). In January 2015, Sonoma County Transit submitted an application to the California OES requesting \$31,815 in FY 2015 CTSGP funds to expand the video security capabilities at SCT's operations and maintenance facility, and to provide new video security equipment at various satellite park-and-ride facilities. Notification of project eligibility from the California OES was sent to SCT in February 2015.

The California OES will not approve an allocation of CTSGP funds to Sonoma County Transit until a project funding plan has been provided that demonstrates that the funds are expected to be available

and sufficient to complete the project. A project funding plan must include completed California OES Financial Management Forms, an Authorized Agent Form, a Grant Assurances Form, and a Governing Body Resolution.

Executive Summary:

The staff of the Department of Transportation and Public Works is requesting the Board approve the First Amendment to the design contract for the replacement of the Lambert Road Bridge over Dry Creek to OPAC Consulting Engineers effective June 30, 2015, extending the term of agreement to June 30, 2019; and approve the First Amendment to the design contract for replacement of Boyes Boulevard Bridge over Sonoma Creek with Moffatt and Nichol effective June 30, 2015 extending the term of agreement to June 30, 2019. Both of these amendments are no-cost time extensions.

The Lambert project will either construct a new bridge downstream from the existing structurally deficient one-lane Lambert Road Bridge (Bridge No. 20C-0248) or modify the existing bridge. Under the replacement scenario, the existing bridge will be left in place and the new two-lane bridge will be designed to meet current design standards including improvements to roadway approaches and appurtenant facilities. The project does not increase vehicular traffic capacity, but will provide two traffic lanes with 5-foot shoulders. This project is 100% federally funded and must satisfy all requirements under the Federal Highway Bridge Program criteria, including approval by the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans). The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) documents for this project will be prepared by the County's Permit and Resources Management Department (PRMD) environmental staff. Services provided under the proposed agreement will include preliminary engineering analysis, field investigation and data

gathering; environmental documentation support for CEQA and NEPA; and analysis, design and preparation of final plans, specifications and estimates. The total cost of the project is estimated to be \$7,200,000. If the amendment is not approved by the Board, the federal and state funds spent to date will be at risk. The County has spent over two years working with a citizen's advisory group formed from local property owners with the intent of working with staff to explore alternatives for replacement and rehabilitation. The most recent meeting was August 21, 2015 where consensus was reached to move forward with the project. The project is now ready to move on with the environmental process. This will be followed by the right-of-way phase. Each of these phases typically take on average one and one half to two years. The agreement is proposed to be extended until June 2019 to allow three years for the completion of the environmental and right-of-way phases, and following with final design and bidding documentation.

The Boyes project will replace the existing structurally deficient two-lane Boyes Boulevard Bridge (Bridge No. 20C-0262) with a new two-lane bridge designed to meet current design standards including improvements to roadway approaches and appurtenant facilities. The replacement bridge will comply with current roadway, drainage, and bridge standards and accommodate the 100-year storm event with freeboard as specified by the County of Sonoma. This project is federally funded and must satisfy all requirements under the Federal Highway Bridge Program criteria, including approval by Caltrans. If the amendment is not approved by the Board, the design of a new bridge will not proceed, and the federal and state funds spent to date will be at risk. Total project costs are estimated to be \$7.5 million. The right-of-way phase of this project has recently started. Resolving the utility relocation for this project was more complicated than originally anticipated. Due to significant investment of time and resources needed to reach agreement among several of the agencies responsible for both above and belowground facilities, additional time was needed. The right-of-way phase could run as long as two years, at the conclusion of which the design consultant will need to prepare the final plans and specifications, and provide support for the bidding process. Therefore, TPW proposes to extend the contract through June 2019. This will allow a small cushion of time in case other unforeseen issues arise.

Both OPAC and Moffatt & Nichol were selected as part of an extensive procurement process. In 2012 the Department advertised a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) in a newspaper of general circulation and received 24 qualification statements from bridge consultants. The proposals were evaluated and ranked by County Staff based on each consultant's response to the following criteria: experience, project team and key staff, technical ability, relevant project experience, federal project experience and project approach. Local preference was not used in the selection of a consultant for this project, as Federal guidelines do not allow for it. A short list of eight on-call consultants was created by the selection committee. These consultants were selected based on their expertise with similar projects. The Department will monitor more closely the length of consultant agreements and attempt to account for unforeseen issues which may arise as these project move forward.

Both amendments in form approved by County Counsel.

Jones & Sons, Inc., in the amount of \$1,582,852.10.

This contract provides for construction of the Healdsburg Intermodal Facility, which includes construction of 48 park and ride spaces adjacent to the historic Northwestern Pacific Railroad (NWP) Healdsburg Depot and a multipurpose pathway between the depot site and Healdsburg Avenue (parallel to the Sonoma Marin Area Rail Transit District (SMART) SMART/NWP right-of-way). The improvements will facilitate future use by SMART when its commuter rail service extends to northern Sonoma County in the future. The facility will also be served by Sonoma County Transit intercity route 60 and Healdsburg local route 67.

Per contract terms, construction is expected to commence within 15 days after the Notice to Proceed is issued with final completion before the expiration of 80 working days.

The project was released for bidding on May 27, 2015 and advertised to prospective bidders on May 29, 2015 in the Press Democrat per noticing requirements for federally funded projects. Additionally, as standard practice, staff distributed a copy of the project plans and specifications to Builder's Exchanges

in the Bay Area and Sacramento regions. Bids were opened on July 29, 2015. No protests were received.

Executive Summary:

The Department of Transportation and Public Works (TPW) requests the Board approve an intergovernmental services agreement between the County and the City of Rohnert Park (RP) for TPW to provide construction inspection and materials testing for a three year term beginning on effective date. Additionally, TPW is also requesting the Board authorize the Director of TPW to execute one three-year extension to this agreement if mutually agreed upon by both agencies.

This agreement is the result of a collaborative effort between TPW and RP to maximize limited resources available within local agencies. On June 19, 2012 the Board approved a similar agreement between these two agencies which has resulted in positive outcomes for both agencies including approximately \$90,000 in revenues to the County over the three-year period. Per Government Code Section 54981, a legislative body of any local agency may contract with any other local agency for the performance by the latter of municipal services or functions within the territory of the former.

TPW is unique in that it is one of the only local government entities within the County that operates a laboratory that has been certified by the State of California for materials testing associated with roadway and bridge projects. By entering into this agreement, RP can perform testing required of federally funded projects at a lower cost and with more flexibility than contracting with a private facility. Construction inspection services can be provided on an as needed basis with staff familiar with the inspection requirements of federally funded projects. All costs to the County are fully reimbursable by RP and the outside funding allows the County flexibility to hire extra-help employees as-needed during peak work periods. Recommended Actions:

Adopt an Ordinance amending Ordinance no. 664 by establishing a prima facie speed limit of 25 miles per hour on Westside Road (#8001) between River Road (#8802B) Mile Post (MP) 10.00 and MP 10.30. (Second Reading-Ready for Adoption)

Executive Summary:

Staff has been working with the Hacienda community to address vehicle speed and safety issues. Over the past several years, community members have identified a number of actions that they would like the County to initiate in an effort to improve traffic conditions. The community has expressed that vehicles entering Hacienda from Westside Road travel through the rural residential area at unsafe speeds.

Staff has worked hard in the careful evaluation of these requests, such as the installation of a stop sign, speed humps, and radar feedback signs. Within the study area, Westside Road is classified as a major collector currently lacking any posted speed limit. As this section of roadway currently has no posted speed limit, options for enforcement by the California Highway Patrol (CHP) are extremely limited.

Staff conducted an Engineering and Traffic Survey pursuant to California Vehicle Code Section 627 and determined that due to road conditions, adjacent land uses, and proximity to the Hacienda community, it is prudent and reasonable to establish a 25 mile per hour speed limit on Westside Road within the Hacienda community. Once established, the CHP would be able to use radar as an enforcement tool as an effective method to address the community's concerns over unsafe vehicle speeds.

In that regard, Transportation and Public Works is requesting that the Board adopt an Ordinance amending Ordinance no. 664 by establishing a 25 mile per hour speed zone on Westside Road (#8001) for approximately 0.3 miles between MP 10.00 and MP 10.30. The estimated cost of labor and materials

for sign installation is \$500 and appropriations are available within the 2015-16 Road Maintenance Budget.

08/25/15: The board adopted a Resolution introducing, reading the title of, and waiving further reading of a proposed Ordinance establishing a speed limit on Westside Road.

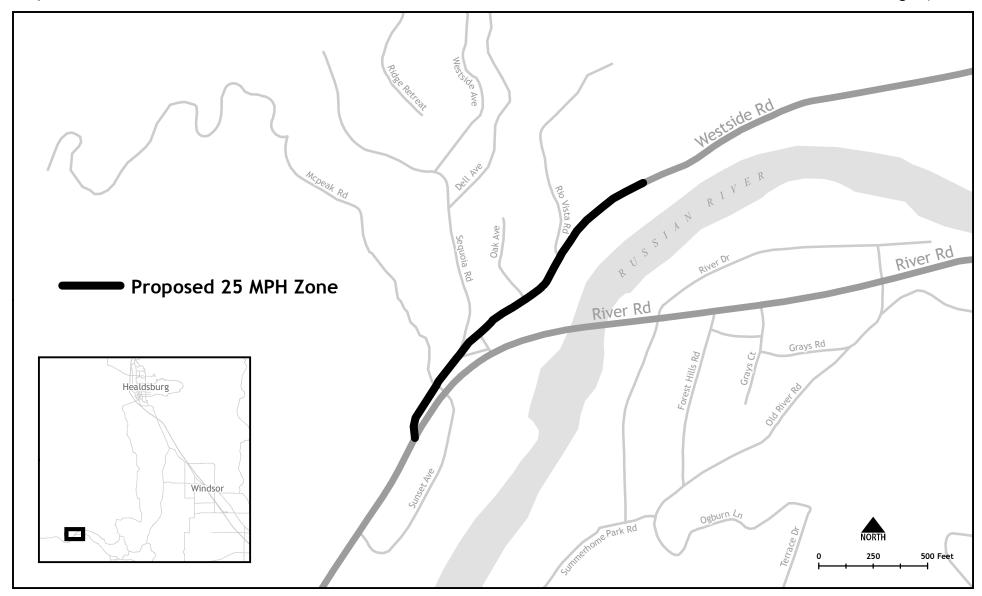

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF SONOMA, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING THE REDUCTION OF SPEED ON WESTSIDE ROAD BETWEEN MP 10.00 AND MP 10.30 AND AMENDING SONOMA COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 664

THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF SONOMA, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I:

Pursuant to the authority provided by California Vehicle Code Section 22358, the Board of Supervisors, on the basis of an Engineering and Traffic Survey completed in compliance with the requirements set forth in California Vehicle Code Section 627 made upon those certain portions of the County highways as set out in this Ordinance, and upon the basis of the findings of these investigations, hereby determines that each portion of the County highway as set out in this Ordinance should have a prima facie speed limit as herein designated. The Board further determines that these prima facie speed limits are reasonable and safe and are most appropriate to facilitate the safe and orderly movement of traffic on the portions of the County highways as are herein listed under each of the prima facie speed limits.

SECTION II

Subsection 120 is hereby added to Section IV of Sonoma County Ordinance No. 664 (said section establishes a prima facie speed limit of 25 miles per hour on certain highways in the County of Sonoma) to read:

Westside Road (#8001) from River Road (#8802B) MP 10.00 to MP 10.30.

SECTION III

This Ordinance shall be, and the same is hereby declared to be in full force and effect from and after thirty (30) days after its passage, and shall be published once before the expiration of fifteen (15) days after said passage, with the names of the Supervisors voting for or against the same, in a newspaper of general circulation published in the County of Sonoma, State of California.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this Ordinance. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and every section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, clauses or phrases be declared unconstitutional or invalid.

This Ordinance shall not be codified.

Executive Summary:

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) is a federal law that was effective July 1, 2015 designed to prepare youth and adults for entry into the labor force. The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act required that all local regions create a Workforce Investment Board (WIB) comprised of local business and community members to oversee and implement the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act.

Membership Criteria and Process for Recommending Members for Appointment

The Sonoma County Workforce Investment Board (WIB) serves as the policy oversight body for its employment and training programs. In accordance with the written agreement between the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors and the WIB, the WIB reviews and approves candidates' applications for membership and forwards its recommendations to the Board of Supervisors for final approval and appointment.

WIB members are not appointed by supervisorial district, but on a county-wide basis, and must have a high degree of policymaking and hiring authority within the organizations they represent. The WIB is required by law to maintain a business majority. The WIB also seeks members who have expertise in Sonoma County's important or emerging employment sectors, such as health care, hospitality, and green technology or who provide workforce-related services. Applications are reviewed by the WIB Executive Committee and are then recommended to the Board of Supervisors for appointment. Current members in good standing are recommended for reappointment at the end of their term.

Efforts to fill the WIB seats are ongoing through referrals from current members and outreach to

businesses, public, labor, and private non-profit organizations. The Human Services Department also works closely with the Economic Development Board to identify business members appropriate for the business seats on the WIB.

Brandy Evans has been with Goodwill Industries for many years and is currently the President and Chief Executive Officer. Ms. Evans has a varied employment background which includes construction, real estate and long-term health care. This is a new appointment, and Ms. Evans will fill a business seat.

Kelly Bass Seibel is the Director of Workforce Development for the Santa Rosa Chamber of Commerce. She has created and managed such programs as the WHEEL program, the Mike Hauser Algebra Academy and the Young Professionals Network, and also works as a link between educators and the business community as workforce development issues in our county are discussed. Ms. Bass Seibel has served on the WIB since May 7, 2013. Ms. Bass Seibel will continue to fill an Economic Development seat on the WIB.

Chris Knerr is the Business Agent for Cement Masons Local 300. He has been with them for eleven years, three as an apprentice, five as a mason, and three years as the current Business Agent. He is interested in the opportunities provided to apprentices within the Building Trades. Mr. Knerr has served on the WIB since May 7, 2013. Mr. Knerr will continue to fill a Labor seat on the WIB.

Jerald Miller is the Dean of Business and Professional Studies for the Santa Rosa Junior College. He is involved in the implementation and coordination of workforce development education at the post secondary level in Sonoma County. He is committed to preparing students so that they have the skills, training, and education to achieve their career goals and that offer programs of study that the Sonoma County employers can rely on to hire and retain outstanding employees. He has been involved with career and technical education for the last twenty years as an instructor and administrator. Mr. Miller has served on the WIB since May 7, 2013. Mr. Miller will continue to fill an Education seat on the WIB.

Chris Snyder is the District 10 Representative for Operating Engineers. Title: 2014-15 Sonoma County Craft Beverage Industry Report & Projects Update

Recommended Actions:

Accept the 2014-15 Sonoma County Craft Beverage Industry Report and an Industry Project Update.

Executive Summary:

The Sonoma County Economic Development Board (EDB) is pleased to present the Sonoma County Craft Beverage Industry - Annual Report. This report offers economic insight into Sonoma County's craft brewery, distillery, and cidery businesses and identifies opportunities for growth. The EDB will also give an update on industry projects completed to date.

Report Summary and Highlights:

The craft beverage industry is typified by a national shift in consumer preferences towards small production, local-ingredients, and high-quality, labor-intensive goods. In the wake of a booming economic recovery, Sonoma County has become a hotbed for starting a craft beverage business. With a discerning customer base, along with several well-established, award-winning breweries, craft beverage producers are experiencing rapid growth and leveraging their reputation to attract tourists to Sonoma County from around the nation.

The 2014-15 Sonoma County Craft Beverage Report examines this sector and quantifies the craft beverage industry in terms of jobs produced and economic impact. Of the businesses surveyed in late 2014, more than 80% responded, including 19 breweries, six distilleries and five cideries. These 30 responses were analyzed to identify industry trends, potential for growth, community contributions and key industry concerns and opportunities.

Highlights from the report include:

- Sonoma County craft beverage producers, defined by the EDB as comprised of the three
 industries of beer, hard cider and distilled spirit manufacturers, accounted for more than 850
 jobs in Sonoma County in 2013, the most current data available.
- The total economic impact of Sonoma County's brewing industry was estimated to be about \$169 million in 2013, up 37% from 2012, and is expected to be even higher when the 2014 figures are compiled. The total economic impact includes industry sales, the impact of these sales on the breweries supply chain, and the impact of the salaries of employees as they spend their earnings in the local economy.
- The brewing industry, which represents the largest of the three industries, was responsible for more than 770 jobs in 2013, up 54% from 2012.
- In 2014, there were 23 breweries, nine distilleries and seven cideries open in Sonoma County. Since 2011, the year-over-year average growth in the formation of new businesses is 21% for craft breweries, 37% for craft cideries and 33% for craft distilleries.
- Regulations at the federal, state and local levels, including permitting requirements, are
 recognized as the highest impediment to industry growth, with more than 40% of businesses
 ranking it the first or second most important issue that they face.
- After regulations, water supply and wastewater management is consistently ranked as the third most important issue facing producers.
- A case study on wastewater in the report highlights improvement underway at Lagunitas
 Brewing Company in Petaluma and at Bear Republic Brewing Company in Cloverdale. Both
 companies have installed a wastewater treatment system that will allow them to reduce their
 wastewater impact. Additionally, the City of Santa Rosa and the City of Petaluma provided
 information related to new developments underway at their treatment facilities.

In addition to tracking the economic impact of the three industries, the EDB is supporting these businesses by offering opportunities to connect through industry events and marketing tools, including:

- Hosting two industry conferences in November 2013 and in February 2015, to support producers
 by providing networking opportunities and presenting sessions on a range of relevant topics
 including marketing, finance, industry regulations, water use and wastewater treatment and
 retail opportunities. Attendance topped 300 and 400 respectively at both events and attendees
 included a cross-section of industry stakeholders, producers, suppliers, government officials and
 professional service providers.
- The EDB produced a printed map identifying all the craft beer, cider and spirits producers in Sonoma County. The map was created in partnership with the Sonoma County Tourism Bureau and Sonoma County GO LOCAL. Since March 2015, more than 5,000 copies of the map have been distributed to local businesses, visitor centers and hotels. The EDB continues to manage updates to the map and plans to print and distribute more copies in Fall 2015.
- The EDB also produced an electronic GIS Story Map of all of the craft beer, cider, and spirits producers in Sonoma County which has garnered over 7,400 hits on our website and which is updated regularly.

A video highlighting several beer, cider and spirit producers was released at the February 2015
conference and continues to be available online on the EDB's YouTube channel. The video is
intended for a broad audience and seeks to raise the visibility of the producers, convey the pride
associated with producing in Sonoma County, and to show the beauty, craftsmanship and artisan
production of craft beverages.

By analyzing and reporting on economic impact and exploring opportunities for future industry growth, the EDB seeks to foster Sonoma County's craft beverage industry as an important asset to the local economy.

The Sonoma County Economic Development Board (EDB) is pleased to present the *Sonoma County Craft Beverage Industry - Annual Report*. This report offers economic insight on Sonoma County's craft brewery, distillery, and cidery businesses and identifies opportunities for growth.

The craft goods industry is typified by a national shift in consumer preferences towards small production, local-ingredients, and high-quality, labor-intensive goods. This means that more American consumers are sampling artisanal, hand-crafted beverages while moving away from mass-produced beers, ciders, and spirits. In Sonoma County, these nationwide trends are reflected by the growing concentration of local craft beer, cider, and spirits producers. Sonoma County's award-winning craft breweries are experiencing rapid growth and leveraging their reputation to attract tourists from around the nation. Meanwhile, local distilleries and cideries continue to seek opportunities to increase output and employment despite the unique challenges they face.

Some highlights and concerns for Sonoma County beer, cider, and spirits businesses include:

- As of 2014, there were 23 craft breweries, 11 craft distilleries, and 7 craft cideries in Sonoma County.
- The Sonoma County craft brewing industry's total economic impact was estimated to be \$169,000,000 in 2013 (most current data available), a 37.4% increase from 2012.
- Raw materials represents the largest overall supply cost to Sonoma County craft
 producers. Many craft producers utilize local ingredients in their products, including
 apples and grains, helping to support local agriculture. As breweries, cideries, and
 distilleries continue to grow in Sonoma County, so too has their demand for local
 supplies and ingredients.
- State regulation has grown to become the number one issue affecting growth for beer, cider, and spirits producers in Sonoma County. Changes in the regulatory environment have been varied, with some progress being made in specific areas. However, as reported by local producers, significant barriers still remain at the state level.

Through reports such as this, the EDB gathers essential data so that businesses and policy makers can identify problems, engage in discussion, and partner to resolve issues that stand in the way of economic success for our region. The EDB is committed to working with our partners to take the actions necessary to build on our strengths and to address our deficiencies – to improve economic opportunities for all Sonoma County residents.

Growth Outlook | Beer, Cider & Spirits

Current Growth in Sonoma County

Sonoma County's craft beverage industry continues to expand rapidly. Since 2000, the number of craft breweries in Sonoma County has almost quadrupled, with 23 breweries open as of 2014. The number of cideries and distilleries has also grown considerably, reflecting the growth potential in these sub-industries. As of 2014, there were 7 cideries and 9 distilleries open in Sonoma County.

It is likely that this strong upwards trend will continue into the future. Of the companies surveyed, 97% expect to expand production in 2015, 79% expect to invest in equipment, and 87% expect to hire more full-time workers.

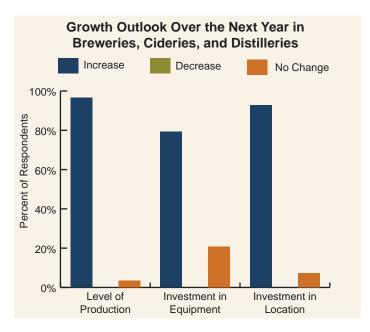
Impediments to Growth

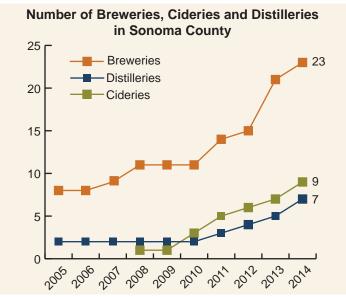
Even with the significant growth in Sonoma County's craft beverage industry, there are still several key impediments challenging local breweries, cideries and distilleries.

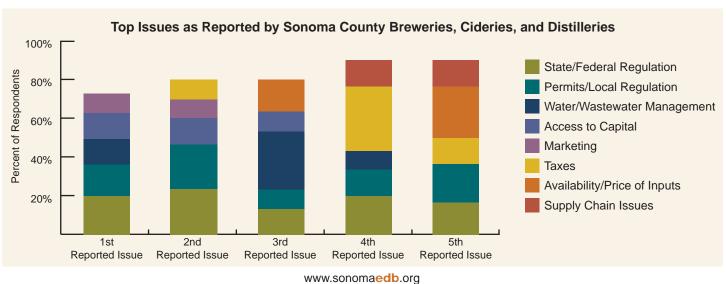
The top reported impediment facing breweries is water and wastewater management. A constant local supply of water is necessary to ensure long term growth of Sonoma County's brewing industry. Coupled with wastewater constraints and sewer line capacity, water management can be viewed as a current and future impediment to growth.

For distilleries, the number one concern was state/federal regulation prohibiting direct sales to consumers. Over 25% of respondents indicated this as their top impediment to growth.

The most concerning issue reported by cideries was state and federal regulations. Specifically, taxation as the most readily identified challenge. The current definition of hard cider only allows for up to 7% alcohol by volume before it is taxed at the more expensive rate for wine, and only a certain level of carbonation before it is subject to the extremely expensive champagne tax (\$3.30 or \$3.40/gallon).







Employment Statistics | Beer, Cider & Spirits

As craft beverage production has grown in Sonoma County, so too has labor employment in the industry, both in part-time and full-time jobs. This section details labor employment in beer, cider, and spirits companies in 2013.

Employment

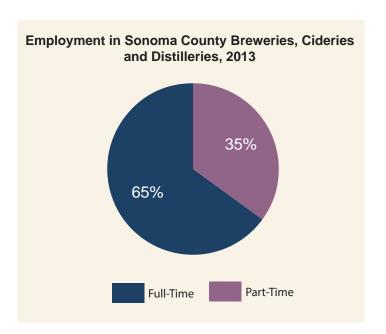
Sonoma County directly employs more than 850 employees through craft beer, cider, and spirits manufacturing. Out of the total number of employees, over a third are employed part-time. Full-time employees comprise about 65% of total employment in the craft beverage industry (avg. 40 hours/wk).

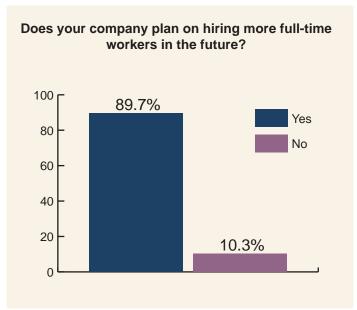
Demand for Labor

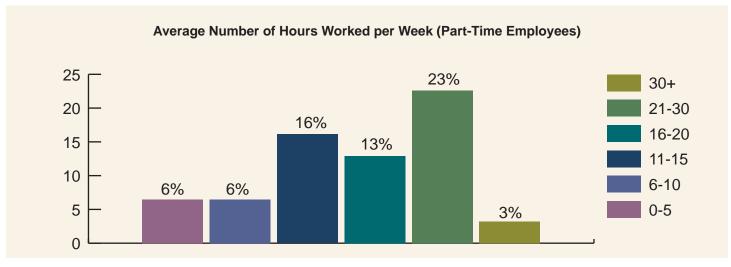
Almost all respondents indicated that they intended to hire more full-time employees in the future. Compared with previous years, this upwards pressure on full-time employment suggests that existing businesses are experiencing continued economic growth. It is also likely that new businesses that have entered the production stage are increasingly able to support additional employees.

Part-Time Workforce

Approximately 40% of companies surveyed indicated that they employed part-time workers (defined as working less than 40 hours/week). Of these companies, nearly 23% indicated that their part-time employees worked an average of 21-30 hours per week. Conversely, 33% indicated that they had no part-time employees. This suggests that while there exists a substantial opportunity for part-time employment in the craft beverage industry, a majority of companies rely on full-time employment alone.

Production, Supply and Distribution | Beer, Cider & Spirits

Product Distribution

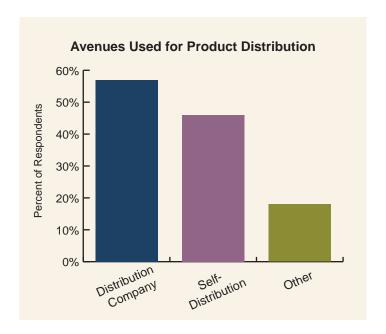
As demonstrated in the graph, the majority of businesses use distribution companies as an avenue to move their products to market. Due to federal and state laws, distilleries are not permitted to self-distribute their products, so 100% of distilleries use distribution companies. The category of other represents companies that have on-site brew pubs where most of their sales are done at the premises.

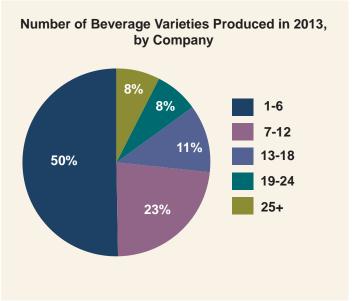
Beverage Varieties

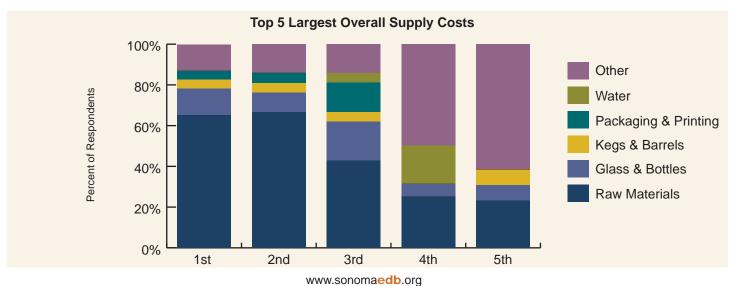
Sonoma County craft beverage producers have varied product portfolios. Within Sonoma County, 50% of businesses produce only 1-6 varieties of a particular beverage, while 23% produce between 7-12. This reflects the presence of seasonal beverages, most relevant to craft breweries, and in some cases cideries. Craft distillers typically limit their production to a few select beverage varieties.

Supply Inputs

For all the industries, the top supply cost overall was raw material, including grains, hops, yeast and apples. Glass and bottles were second overall, followed by kegs and barrels. Water was reported generally as the third or fourth highest expense to craft beverage producers, potentially reflecting the low water demands that smaller companies face. Finally, labor, equipment and other machinery comprises the category of "Other". Ultimately, the chart below illustrates the potential economic benefit of locally available supplies to Sonoma County craft beverage producers, as the brewing industry alone purchased nearly \$15 million in local goods and services in 2013.







Community Impact | Beer, Cider & Spirits

Involvement in community philanthropy is an important aspect for Sonoma County's breweries, cideries, and distilleries. The majority of the businesses are invested in creating a positive community impact.

Fundraising and Charity

Almost 90% of respondents indicated that their business participated in either fundraising events, volunteering, or giving to charity organizations. The majority of Sonoma County breweries, cideries, and distilleries participate in events and organizations that raise money for local charities.

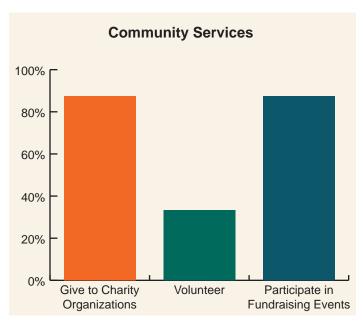
It is estimated that in 2013 Sonoma County breweries, cideries, and distilleries donated over \$300,000 (both in-kind and in cash) to charities both locally and nationally.

Furthermore, local craft beverage producers fundraise for a wide scope and a number of different causes. Russian River Brewing Company holds a month-long fundraiser in October to raise money for breast cancer research, and reports raising over \$100,000 each year. Other companies listed their participation in donations to non-profit organizations, in-kind donations for auctions, and other community efforts.

Economic Impact Analysis | Craft Breweries

Craft breweries in Sonoma County continue to hold a significant impact on the local economy. The most current data available at the time of this analysis was for 2013. The economic impact is expected to increase significantly as more recent data becomes available.

Employment

As of 2013, Sonoma County's breweries directly employed over 770 individuals with total sales of \$117 million. Comparison of the percentage of brewery employment relative to the labor force shows that employment in the brewery industry is 11 times more concentrated in Sonoma County compared to the US.

Economic Analysis

The economic impact of Sonoma County's brewery industry in 2013 is estimated to be \$168,640,012. This figure includes both the direct output of the breweries themselves as well as the indirect economic multiplier effects associated with their output. The indirect effect measures the additional income to industries linked to the brewery supply chain that in turn use the income to support additional jobs and output. The figure also includes the economic effects of employee spending in the local economy using income earned from the brewery's output. By aggregating all of these effects, the estimated total impact reflects the overall contribution of the craft brewing industry applied to Sonoma County's regional economy as a whole. In order to calculate the multiplier effects, the EDB utilized IMPLAN (Impact Analysis for Planning), a modeling software widely used by organizations for economic impact analysis. A detailed methodology of the analysis can be found in Appendix A.

Tax Revenue from Craft Brewing

In addition to the economic impact of craft brewing in Sonoma County that extends to the local economy, the industry generates an estimated total tax revenue of approximately \$43,393,412. Of this value, local and state tax comprised \$25,467,508, while federal tax comprised \$17,925,904. These revenues come from multiple sources of taxation, including employee income taxes, sales taxes, taxes on production and imports, and indirect business taxes. The bulk of federal tax revenue generated from craft brewing comes from excise and consumption taxes.

While it is unknown how much overall tax revenue is retained at the local level, it is a common practice for economic reports to include tax figures into their impact analyses. Thus, if tax revenue is attributed to craft brewing in Sonoma County as an additional component of the industry's full economic impact, the combined total value is estimated to exceed \$212,000,000. Of this figure, this report can assume with relative confidence that at least \$169,000,000 is retained within Sonoma County.

Wastewater | Infrastructure Development

Overview

Both the City of Santa Rosa as well as the City of Petaluma have begun implementing plans to improve their existing wastewater treatment facilities. As the two largest municipal treatment plants in the county, Santa Rosa and Petaluma handle a significant portion of waste sent in from craft breweries, cideries, and distilleries. As these businesses have grown, along with other local businesses in the county, there has been increased need for expanded wastewater treatment capacity.

Separately, Lagunitas and Bear Republic have both invested in new wastewater treatment technology that will allow them to reuse a larger percentage of their wastewater for production purposes, while simultaneously reducing their discharge loads to municipal plants.

City of Santa Rosa Development Update

The City of Santa Rosa has recently opened bids for its planned High Strength Waste Receiving Facility that will be added to the Laguna Treatment Plant.

As outlined, a receiving facility will be constructed to receive up to 40,000 gallons per day of high strength liquid waste. The system will leverage existing infrastructure at the Laguna Treatment Plant, increase disposal service alternatives for existing and future local businesses, offset power costs, and help to reduce the need to truck waste outside of Sonoma County. The project is expected to be completed in the summer of 2015.

City of Petaluma Development Update

The City of Petaluma is working to add several new components to its existing wastewater treatment plant.

Petaluma has invested in new equipment along with designs for a new digestor that is expected to be completed in 2017. The City is working to increase the plant's tertiary water capacity that will allow for increased treatment and storage of water gathered during the winter and spring for use in the summer. The project is awaiting grant funding and is targeted for completion by 2017. Additionally, Petaluma is seeking funding to expand the facility's ability to receive high strength waste solids, which is of particular relevance to the local beer, cider, and spirits industry.

Wastewater | Brewery Development

Lagunitas Brewing Company

Since expanding its Petaluma brewery in 2011, wastewater management has become a significant challenge for the Lagunitas Brewing Company. Having outgrown the capabilities of Petaluma's municipal wastewater treatment facility, Lagunitas currently trucks its high-density wastewater to the East Bay Municipal Utility District in Oakland. Lagunitas estimates that wastewater represents a total cost of about \$2.2 million to the company, with approximately \$1.3 million attributed to trucking alone.

Bear Republic Brewing Company

In 2013, motivated to reduce wastewater impact fees and ensure a stable water supply for the future, the City of Cloverdale and Bear Republic Brewing Company invested in a public-private partnership to construct two new wells for the City, with the ability to produce 600 to 1,000 gallons of water per minute. Even with the opportunity to grow production with increased access to water, Bear Republic is committed to reducing their water usage, currently achieving a 3.5 to 1 water-to-beer use ratio, far below the 7 to 1 industry average.

Investment in New Technology

Recently, Lagunitas and Bear Republic initiated projects to install their own wastewater treatment systems after purchasing new technology from Cambrian Innovation, a biotechnology firm based in Boston, MA. Known as the EcoVolt, the system is used to remove suspended solids and organic matter from wastewater, as well as offset power costs, through the production of biogas that can be used on-site to generate both heat and electricity.

Cambrian has also partnered with Lagunitas to develop an advanced treatment train that will further clean the brewery's water using membrane bioreactors (MBR) and reverse osmosis (RO). This will enable Lagunitas to clean its wastewater down enough to be re-used on site for applications that do not come in contact with beer, such as cleaning.

Overview of the EcoVolt System

The EcoVolt system utilizes electrically active organisms that produce a measurable electric current as well as a small amount of methane gas as they digest organic matter in wastewater (such as yeast, grain and hop residuals). This process is known as electromethanogenesis. Though the electric current emitted by the microbes is not enough to be a primary power source, it enables technicians to assess the performance of the system in real-time. Electrodes used to monitor the system will also afford greater stability and higher methane fraction, resulting in a simpler, more economically efficient process. These factors are hugely valuable in terms of ensuring consistent, reliable operation. Most important, the system is designed to scale to the needs of the brewery. As Lagunitas reports, their company will be able to deploy capital prudently to manage operation of the system while accounting for the brewery's continued growth.

Appendix A | Economic Impact Methodology

Premise

The EDB surveyed Sonoma County breweries, distilleries, and cideries in order to assess their impact on the county and identify impediments to growth. This survey was partially motivated by recent economic reports on the brewery industry for Larimer County, Colorado (The Economic Impacts of Breweries on Larimer County, Colorado State University, 2011), Colorado State (Craft Brewers Industry Overview and Economic Impact, University of Colorado, 2012), and California State (California Craft Brewing Industry: An Economic Impact Study, University of California, Berkley, 2012). The major similarity between all three reports is the use of the IMPLAN modeling software to perform the economic impact analysis. In producing an economic impact analysis for Sonoma County, the EDB used these reports as a model to develop its own survey.

While distilleries and cideries were surveyed, and their responses show up throughout the report, the EDB was unable to perform an economic analysis in the same way as it did with breweries. Due to a small sample size, the EDB could not report their impact without compromising their anonymity. Suppressing sensitive business data because of this circumstance is a common practice among data providers such as the BLS and California EDD.

Survey

The survey was deployed in late 2014. An effort was made to include input from all Sonoma County breweries, distilleries, and cideries. A list of Sonoma County businesses that were classified as a manufacturer of beer, spirits, or cider was created using information from the California EDD, InfoGroup, press articles, and the California Craft Brewers Association. The survey data informed the analysis presented on growth outlook, employment, production, supply, distribution, community impact, and economic impact. Responses were received from 30 companies, accounting for more than 80% of the businesses surveyed.

Analysis

The IMPLAN software models the impact of an event on a given economy which is referred to as input-output analysis. An extensive database of industry-specific economic data allows IMPLAN to generate a Social Accountability Matrix. This matrix is used to track the interactions between different sectors of the target economy, and in doing so, provides the basis for calculating an event multiplier.

Survey recipients were asked to indicate their number of full-time and part-time employees in 2013, along with their total sales in 2013. The aggregate brewery sales and employment were allocated to IMPLAN sector 71 to run the analysis. Since all beer production takes place within Sonoma County, the

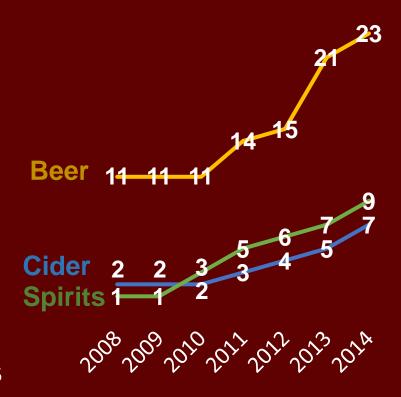

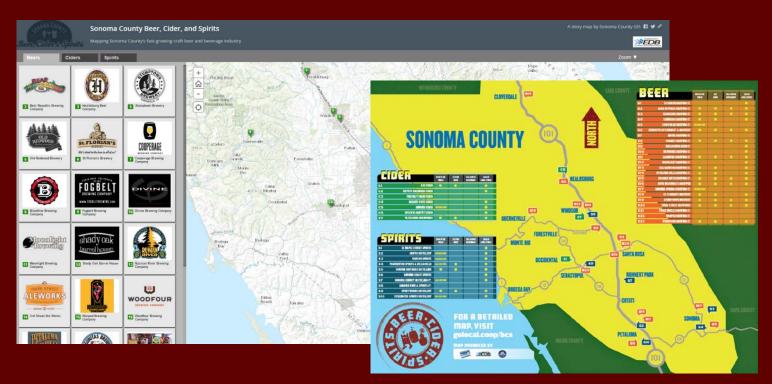

Executive Summary:

The Department of Transportation and Public Works – Airport Division (Airport) is requesting the Board approve a resolution adopting a Negative Declaration for new hangar construction at the Airport and authorize the Chair to execute: (a) a 40-year lease between the County and Redwood Hangar, LLC (Redwood) for approximately 5.47 acres (Premises) at the Airport which allows Redwood to construct the new hangar; and (b) a Consent to Sublease consenting to the proposed sublease of a portion of the Premises from Redwood to Spectra Hangar, LLC; and (c) a Bill of Sale selling the Redwood Hangar leasehold improvement to Tenant in the amount of \$500,000 paid over 15 years; and (d) authorize the Director of Transportation and Public Works to execute any other documents reasonably required to effect said transactions.

The Redwood Hangar, LLC, a.k.a Sonoma Jet Center ("Redwood") has provided aeronautical services to both general aviation customers and aeronautical service operators at the Airport since 2004. They have successfully increased their business and now desire to enter into a new long term 40-year ground lease in order to expand its operations at the Airport. The current FAA-approved Airport Layout Plan designates this proposed lease area as a Corporate Hangars site that is congruent with Redwood's

development plan. In addition, the Airport Master Plan, as adopted by the Board of Supervisors on January 24, 2012, supports Redwood's development as stated in Chapter 4-11, "...Plans for long-term development of the Airport's building area should allow for expansion of the existing primary FBOs, as well as establishment of additional specialty FBOs."

Redwood currently has three ground leases at the Airport. Under the proposed new ground lease, the old leases will immediately terminate and Redwood will have one consolidated ground lease comprising of approximately 5.47 acres, which adds approximately 1.13 acres to their operations. The proposed term of the new ground lease is 40 years and comprises of three parcels described as follows: 1) Parcel A includes the existing buildings of a 12,608± square foot hangar known as the "Redwood Hangar", a 2,900± square foot terminal building and an aviation-support building. Parcel A also includes a fuel farm that contain large tanks that store and dispense aviation fuel; 2) Parcel B is primarily vacant land where Redwood will be constructing a new 18,653± square foot executive hangar together with 4,203± square feet of associated office space. This site will require the demolition of an existing two-story office building located within the site at the east end of this Parcel B and upgrading the parking area at the west end of this Parcel B. The remaining portion of the land will be paved for the hangar ramp area; and 3) Parcel C is a 9,356 square foot area that allows Redwood to construct paved connections from the new hangar to the adjacent taxi lane. The term for Parcel C will expire after five years and revert to the County. The following tables contrast the terms of the proposed Ground Lease against the leases that Redwood currently occupies which will be terminated should the Board approve the proposed consolidated ground lease:

In compliance with State and County regulations, a California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) study was performed for the new hangar construction to identify environmental impacts caused by new development. This study did not identify any significant neighborhood impacts and none were expected given the location and type of existing use at the Airport. Therefore adoption of a Negative Declaration resolution for the proposed improvements is requested at this time.

Spectra Hangar, LLC is the sponsor of the new hangar development and the proposed sublessee of the new hangar. Spectra Hangar demonstrated its financial capability by providing financial statements to the Airport. The Ground Lease between the County and Redwood requires approval of any sublessee.

Redwood Hangar was originally built by the Army in the 1940s when the Airport was known as the Santa Rosa Army Airfield. This hangar has been renovated and modified over the years and remains in service today. The Redwood Hangar is owned by the Airport and was leased to Redwood Hangar, LLC. The Airport had the hangar leasehold improvements appraised and offered Redwood the opportunity to purchase the improvements. Redwood, as part of the lease negotiations, has agreed to purchase the Redwood Hangar at the full appraised price of \$500,000 and will assume all structural, maintenance and

² The term of a land lease is essential to a tenant building a hangar at the Airport. Financing is usually involved when constructing large hangars and the tenant requires a long-term lease to adequately maintain earnings to pay the debt of constructing the hangar. The Airport has determined that a fair and equitable formula for determining a tenant's lease term that allows parity for the Airport and the tenant; it correlates the amount invested into buildings by the tenant with the number of years of the leasehold at the Airport.

³ In addition to ground rental rates, the Airport collects percentage rent on aeronautical activities. The rate is usually three percent (3%) of gross sales of merchandise or labor.

insurance liability for it. The proposed purchase price will be paid over fifteen years at a four percent interest resulting in additional revenues of \$44,381 annually. The Bill of Sale is attached. At the termination of the lease the improvements will revert to the County.

County Counsel has approved both the form of the Redwood Ground Lease and the Consent to Sublease. County Counsel has reviewed the associated Negative Declaration.

Airport staff recommends the Board approve the new Redwood Lease and approve the Consent to Sublease. The new hangar development will allow for additional growth in both general aviation and specialized aeronautical service commerce that provide increased revenue for the Airport. The construction cost of this new hangar is in excess of \$3,000,000 and will benefit the local economy with both short and long term financial benefits. The Airport will receive additional revenue from the increase in the Leased Premise square footage and percentage rents resulting from increased aeronautical business.

Prior Board Actions:

July 13, 2010 – Second Amendment and Assignment of the previous Main Airport Lease. This Board action approved the Second Amendment to the Lease that corrected the square footage of the leasehold and then Assigned the lease to Redwood Hangar, LLC to continue operating a full service Fixed-Base Operator at the Airport providing services, including fuel operations, to Aviation customers.

The Airport's mission is to successfully manage a key component of the County's transportation infrastructure and continue to be a significant contributor to a strong and diverse economy that supports job growth and job retention for Sonoma County. Increased business growth and new construction at the Airport embraces this goal.

Narrative Explanation of Fiscal Impacts (If Required):

The increase of rent associated with this new lease will result in additional annual revenue to the Airport of \$12,625 in the first year (impact of \$10,521 for remaining 10 months of FY 15-16); future years will include additional annual Consumer Price Index increases of minimum 2% and maximum 6% for the next nine years before the rent is reset to market. Additionally, the sale of the Redwood Hangar will result in \$44,381 annually in new revenue (\$36,984 for remaining 10 months of FY 15-16). The sale will also

eliminate maintenance expenses and potential renovation costs as well as decreasing risk/peril liabilities of owning the seventy year old building.

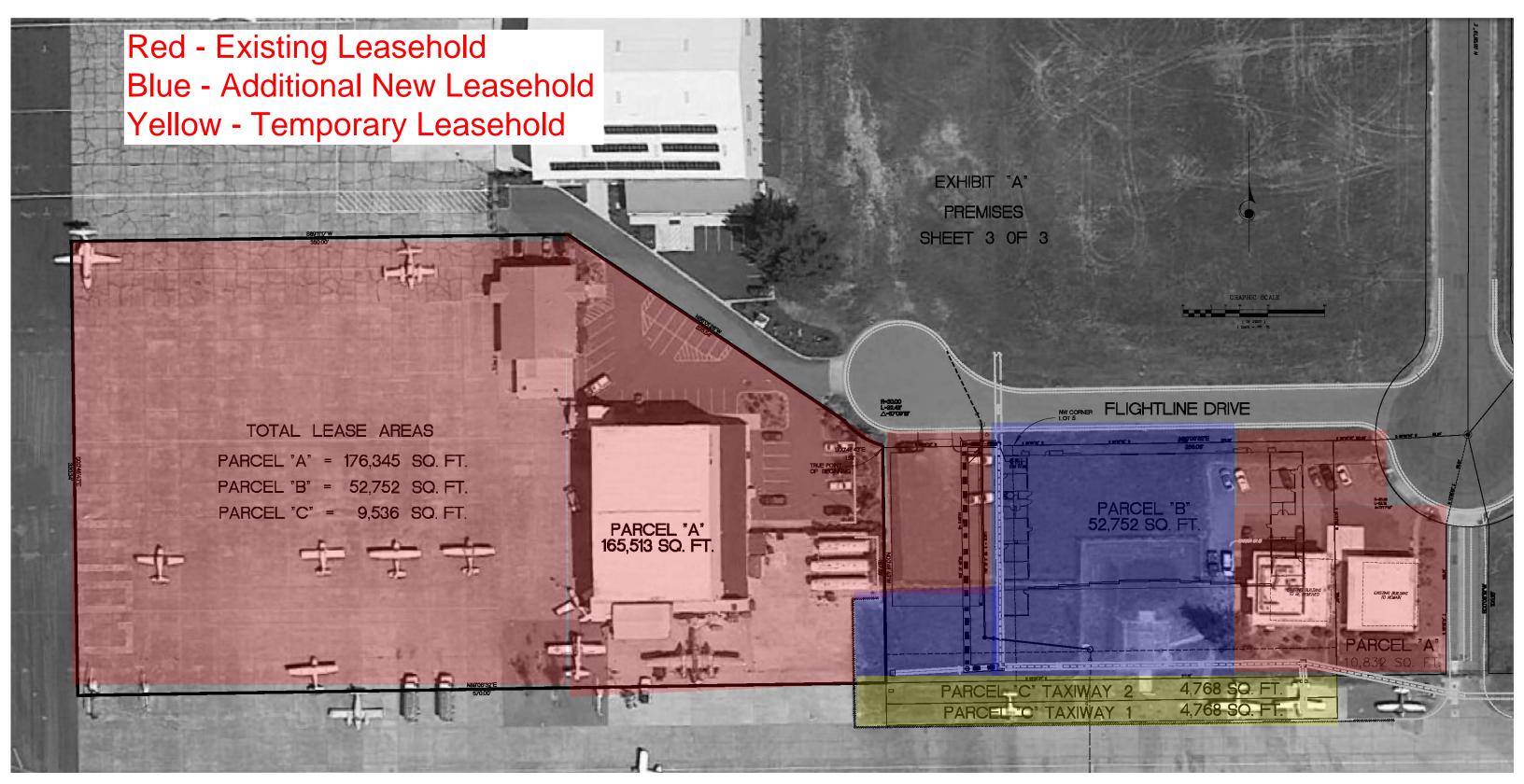

Whereas, Redwood Hangar, LLC, a/k/a Sonoma Jet Center, has requested to construct a hangar at the Charles M. Schulz – Sonoma County Airport to the County through the Permit and Resource Management Department (PRMD), known as File Number ADR15-0002 and the Project Title as Flightline Executive Hangar; and

Whereas, the proposed project allows construction of an 18,653-square foot aircraft storage hangar with 4,203 square-feet of associated office space located at opposite ends of the building. Site improvements include demolition of an existing two-story office building located within the project site to the east, upgrading the existing parking area at the opposite end of the site to the west, and adding approximately 1.16 acres of paving to provide sufficient ramp area to the adjoining Apron D taxiway. The project site currently has approximately 0.546 acres of hardscape in the form of paved parking areas and walkways. Upon project completion, the site will consist of 1.71 acres of hardscape.

Whereas, pursuant to Section 15071 of the State of California CEQA Guidelines, an initial study as resulted in the Negative Declaration of findings that the proposed project could not have a significant adverse impact on the environment; and

Whereas, notice and public review of the Negative Declaration and Initial Study were provided in accordance with State and County CEQA guidelines; and

Whereas, the initial study, Negative Declaration and its associated comments are attached for review by this Board as follows:

- 1. The Negative Declaration has been prepared for this project pursuant to the requirements of CEQA, and reflects this Board's independent judgment and analysis.
- 2. There is no substantial evidence before the Board that the proposed project may have a significant effect on the environment, and therefore, adoption of the Negative Declaration is appropriate under CEQA and State and County CEQA guidelines.
- 3. The project will not result in a safety hazard or noise problem for persons using the airport or for persons working in the project area.
- 4. The project has been conditioned to meet all Federal, State and local laws and adopted standards in regard to the project site.
- 5. The Project is located within the Santa Rosa Plain area, and therefore required to comply with procedures set forth in the adopted Santa Rosa Plain Conservation Strategy for California Tiger Salamander (CTS). The Project will impact approximately 0.46 acre acres of suitable CTS upland habitat. The required mitigation for impacts to 0.46 acre of suitable CTS upland habitat is 0.09 acre. Mitigation for impacts to suitable CTS upland habitat will be accomplished by Redwood Hangar, LLC purchasing the requisite amount of CTS mitigation credits (0.09 acre of CTS mitigation credits) from Hazel Mitigation Bank, which has been approved by the USFWS and CDFW to sell CTS mitigation credits. The purchase of the CTS mitigation credits will be approved by USFWS prior to completing the purchase of the credits from Hazel Conservation Bank. Compliance with the requirements of the Santa Rosa Plain Conservation Strategy will ensure that impacts to biological resources will be less than significant.
- 6. The project has been conditioned to meet all State and local laws and adopted standards in regard to Storm Water runoff. This includes using Best Management Practices for project design, construction, and post construction monitoring.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Board hereby adopts the Negative Declaration for the project, certifies the Negative Declaration has been completed, reviewed, and considered, together with comments received during the public review process, in compliance with CEQA and the State CEQA guidelines, and finds that the Negative Declaration reflects the independent judgment of the Board.

Be It Further Resolved that the Board hereby authorizes the Chair of the Board to execute the lease agreement with Redwood Hangar LLC, authorizes the construction of the hangar, the sale of the Redwood Hangar, the approval of the Spectra Hangar, LLC sublease; and authorizes the Director of Transportation and Public Works to execute any other documents reasonable required to effect said Lease.

Executive Summary:

On June 20, 1997, the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors (Board) adopted Resolution No. 97-0827 (Resolution), outlining road naming and addressing procedures and standards for applications made by private parties on roads in the unincorporated area of Sonoma County (County).

These procedures and standards require any applicant for a development permit to file an application of such intent with the Permit and Resource Management Department (PRMD). Owners of the property fronting on and/or being addressed may petition the County to name the roads pursuant to the 'Standard for Road Names' outlined in section XII of the Resolution. Notice of a public hearing was posted on August 22, 2015, at least 10 days prior to the hearing pursuant to Government Code section 6061. Naming of new public roads requires approval by the Board at the noticed public hearing. Fire and Emergency Services (FES) reviews the names to ensure that they meet the standards set forth in section XIII of the resolution. Among other more general standards, these ensure that road names do not duplicate existing road names, are not geographically confusing, are compatible with existing road names, and help ensure that they will not create confusion for emergency responders.

Property owner Paseo Vista Inc. representative Mike Gasparini submitted eight public road name applications for consideration for the Paseo Vista Subdivision (PLP09-0053) to FES through PRMD on January 28, 2015. The proposed new road names are:

- 1. Palmilla Place
- 2. Las Ventanas Drive
- 3. Medano Drive
- 4. Melia Drive
- 5. Pedrigal Place
- 6. Solmar Place
- 7. Pueblo Bonito Place
- 8. Miaterra Drive

These public road names are associated with a new development (PLP09-0053) approved in the 2014 Sonoma County General Plan – Housing Element (p. H-76) and, other than the applicant, there are no other property owners associated with the naming of these roads.

FES, on behalf of PRMD, recommends adoption of a Resolution approving the naming of eight new public road names in the Paseo Vista Subdivision.
