



## Mobile Crisis Services Benefit



- California Department of Health Care Services is requiring counties to provide community-based mobile services to Medi-Cal beneficiaries experiencing a behavioral health crisis beginning January 1, 2024.
- Provides rapid response, individual assessment and community-based stabilization to reduce the immediate risk of danger and subsequent harm.
- Avoids unnecessary emergency department care, psychiatric inpatient hospitalizations and law enforcement involvement.

# Regional Collaboration



- Partner with SAFE & in RESPONSE to increase their capabilities to serve their existing jurisdictions.
- Expand and revise existing Behavioral Health MST to meet new DHCS requirements.
- Establish MOUs with cities & law enforcement for dispatch and mutual support.

## Crisis Services Hotline



- One telephone number to serve as a crisis services hotline for the dispatch of mobile crisis teams 24/7.
- Utilize the existing 1-800-746-8181 number used by the Crisis Stabilization Unit (CSU) and has been used in the community and given to those in crisis for years.
- Will provide a "live" response with staffresponding to all calls from the hotline. Answering service not allowed.
- Coordinate with in RESPONSE, SAFE, 988, local law enforcement, 911, and community partners.

# Dispatch of Teams



- Astandardized dispatch tool and procedures to determine when to dispatch a mobile crisis team.
- Procedures identifying how mobile crisis teams will respond to dispatch requests.
- Team will meet the individual in crisis at their location unless they request to be met at an alternate location.
- Currently evaluating infrastructure needs including dispatch and call systems.

# Team Requirements



- Each team must have 2 responders (1 may respond via telehealth under certain conditions).
- At least 1 team member shall be carrying, trained, and able to administer naloxone.
- At least 1 member shall be able to conduct a crisis assessment.
- If team does not have a licensed practitioner of the healing arts (LPHA), one must be available via telehealth.

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#### Policy 309 Canines

CAC welcomes Sheriff Engram's recently published public commitment that when "we see a chance that we can do better or tighten up a policy, then we will."

California law now expressly requires law enforcement agencies to maintain policies which provide "comprehensive and specific guidelines regarding approved methods and devices available for the application of force," which plainly includes canine policy. See Penal Code Section 7286. Cal DOJ and Cal POST have both expressly emphasized this statutory requirement for clearer guidance to law enforcement. See Cal DOJ Information Bulletin 2020-DLE-10; POST Use of Force Standards and Guidelines, 2021.

Some LE agencies in California and elsewhere have responded to this legal requirement by recommending and implementing canine policies providing increased detail and specificity in guidance for the deployment and use of canines. The general thrust is to more clearly anticipate and define scenarios supporting appropriate uses and limitations and controls on canine use, all as a matter of official, adopted policy.

To respond to these legal requirements and to public demand for reform including active civilian oversight, CAC requests that SCSO (1) promptly respond to previous CAC recommendations regarding canine policy, dated July 12, 2021, and (2) thoroughly review its Policy 309 "Canines," and provide updated comprehensive and specific guidelines for field canine deployment, including:

- Develop a thorough, humane statement of purpose and intention regarding public safety reasons for law enforcement canine uses, together with a stated recognition that canines and handlers must be properly trained, supervised, deployed and subject to strict control and review by supervisors and command staff. See Sacramento PD GO 580.14 Intro material.
- 2. Update current policy language, much of which is undefined and overly subjective. SCSO Policy 309 discloses a heavy reliance on undefined terms and generalized concepts which leave the handler with often unstructured general discretion. Handlers can "deploy" canines as deemed "appropriate" and "reasonable," when a suspect has committed or "threatened to commit" and "serious offense," and is an "imminent threat," or is resisting or "threatening to resist arrest" or is "concealed." More structure and definition are needed to meet statutory requirements and to assist, support and structure patrol deputies' decision making in the field.

- 3. Consider identifying specific crimes, categories of crimes or conduct which DO, and which specifically DO NOT, warrant use of canine to find and bite when other listed exigency criteria are met. See Sac PD GO 580.14 at C.1, 2.
- 4. Consider specifically requiring handler to obtain approval from field supervisor prior to search or find and bite deployment. Exception for rapidly evolving situations preventing timely access to supervisor. See Sac PD GO 580.14 A. 1.
- 5. Develop comprehensive, specific guidance regarding specific tasks which are to be accomplished with leashed canines. Expressly define limited authorization to use unleashed canines to bite, or find and bite, dangerous suspects under comprehensively and specifically described circumstances.
- 6. Develop comprehensive, specific guidance requiring that canine is to be deployed to find and bite for strictly limited articulable tactical purposes and strictly controlled, limited duration. Canine is to be continuously monitored and re-evaluated by handler, who remains responsible for the canine throughout the deployment.
- 7. Develop specific guidance and criteria for when a canine will and will not be released to find and bite (1) an on view suspect, (2) a suspect believed/not believed to be violent, (3) a suspect believed/not believed to be armed, (4) an unseen or concealed suspect, (5) a fleeing suspect, etc. Identify scenarios commonly encountered in field and provide comprehensive and specific guidance for each.
- 8. Develop specific guidance and criteria which require canine handler to order canine to release suspect.(ie, verbal surrender; hands seen not in possession of weapon, physical compliance with orders, etc.) See Sac PD GO 580.14 at C.3.
- 9. Develop specific requirement that canine handler shall ensure that canine is continuously trained and prepared to release a bitten suspect on command, and provide comprehensive, specific guidelines as to what action shall be taken when canine does not immediately release when ordered.
- 10. Develop plain statement that handler is responsible for deployed canine at all times and that deployment and use of canine in violation of policy is grounds for discipline as is any use of force which violates department policy.
