Summary

At the previous meeting, CoC Board members and others asked for the Lead Agency staff to follow up on specific items. Staff summarized responses to present at the April 26th CoC Board meeting.

Discussion

A summary of follow-ups from the previous meeting(s). At the previous meeting, CoC Board members and others asked for the Lead Agency staff to follow up on the following questions or comments.

1. Housing Voucher Public Comment Recommendation Clarifications (from Martha Cheever):

A. (Clarification request from CoC Board) Taking CES away brings us back to first come first serve. How will they be prioritized to the referrals if outside of CES?

CES is still an option for referrals for the revised homeless preference. The change was made to so that referrals may also come from service providers. In order to help move people through the continuum, service providers will be able to refer persons who have successfully participated in a transitional housing program, an interim housing program, or an emergency shelter program within Sonoma County.

In order to ensure that the referrals are made in an unbiased manner, all service providers who partner with the Housing Authority on this preference will be required to enter into an MOU outlining responsibilities. Expectations of service providers will be:

- Maintaining an organizational prioritization list
- Referred households/persons will need to be able to maintain independent housing with minimal supportive services

- Provision of housing navigation
- Provision of housing stabilization services for a minimum of one-year posthousing

This preference will follow the same referral process as the Mainstream Voucher program. Whenever vouchers referrals are available, the Housing Authority will send an email to all referral partners allocating a certain number of referrals to each agency.

B. (Clarification request from CoC Board) Additional information on homeless preference and how that would lead back to being out of compliance (believe this had to do with the audit and the homeless preference = a form of discrimination/ not increasing beyond 50%)

The Housing Choice Voucher program is meant to serve all low-income persons, not one segment of a population. "The housing choice voucher program is the federal government's major program for assisting very low-income families, the elderly, and the disabled to afford decent, safe, and sanitary housing in the private market." (HUD.Gov, Housing Choice Voucher Fact Sheet)

SCHA History of Jurisdiction Preference

- Prior to 2018, the Housing Authority local policies prioritized persons who lived, worked, or were homeless in Sonoma County
- In 2018, the Housing Authority underwent a HUD Fair Housing Audit
- HUD FHEO determined that the jurisdiction preference was causing a disparate impact on minority populations who may not have had an opportunity to reside in Sonoma County
- The Housing Authority removed the jurisdiction preference

The introduction of homeless preferences brings back a jurisdictional preference of sorts.

- Because homeless dedicated vouchers are provided to people who are working with service providers in Sonoma County, persons outside of our area likely do not have an opportunity to receive them
- In order to ensure that our local policies do not have a disparate impact on minority populations, best practice is to limit them to ensure that people outside of Sonoma County still have an equal opportunity to become housed in Sonoma County

The Sonoma County Housing Authority operates a Mainstream Voucher program (261 vouchers) and an Emergency Housing Voucher program (153 vouchers) which are solely dedicated to persons experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness. The

preferences added to the Housing Choice Voucher program expand the vouchers available to serve these populations.

2. Ending Homelessness Racial Equity Work:

During the last CoC Board meeting in March, staff presented information on efforts to address racial inequities within the homeless system of care through technical assistance provided through Homebase by the California Department of Housing & Community Development (CA HCD). The following is provided as updates as to what progress has been made with these efforts since the CoC Board last met:

Coordinated Entry System (CES):

Technical assistance providers have conducted several listening sessions to begin the process of redesigning the assessment and prioritization in the local Coordinated Entry System (CES). A listening session was held with the CoC Lead Agency and HomeFirst staff, and a separate session was held with providers who receive referrals from CES.

The listening sessions sought to understand:

- Challenges and opportunities around the CES assessment and prioritization;
- understanding what types of changes are feasible;
- the community vision towards assessment and prioritization is simple or complex; and
- incorporating equity in coordinated entry improvements around assessment and prioritization.

The CoC Lead Agency staff will continue to provide updates to the board as the re-design process moves forward.

Tribal Nations Collaboration:

Staff met with TA consultant multiple times, and communications have started between tribal nations within Sonoma County and Homebase. Our first training that will be available to the community will be held on April 20th at 1:00 pm at the CoC Quarterly Membership meeting. The agenda and meeting login information can be found on our website here: https://sonomacounty.ca.gov/quarterly-membership-meeting-april-20-2023 For those who are unable to attend, this meeting will be recorded and posted on our website to review at your convenience. There will be guest speakers from different local tribes during each event.

The three Conversational Workshops for CoC core members are scheduled; the staff is still working on confirming those who will be in attendance. These sessions are by invitation only and will take place from May through June 2023.

Racial Equity Workgroup:

Members of this workgroup are in the final stages of confirmation. The TA Plan originally had a target to schedule this meeting by the end of this month. However, this timeline has been extended for select CoC Lead Agency Staff to have a three-day in-person training with Just Process, as part of the Department of Health Services (DHS) Equity Circle. This three-day training will cover essential equity and racial justice foundational work. Staff participating in the trainings will join the DHS Racial Equity Circle, working with other County of Sonoma departments, including the Office of Equity. This will ensure racial equity efforts are aligned and reduce duplication of efforts.

3. Samaritan Information from Chessy Etheridge:

During the Continuum of Care (CoC) Board meeting on March 22, 2023, Chessy Etheridge shared a brief update during the Word from the Street agenda item about Samaritan, a support platform for potential consideration of implementation in Sonoma County. Board members requested a link to Samaritan be sent to the board to review. The link was emailed to the CoC Board on March 29, 2023. The link to Samaritan is included below:

SUMMARY

There is an opportunity for the Continuum of Care Board to send letters of support to those jurisdictions who are pursuing the State of California's most proactive housing position — that being achieving a "prohousing designation" (PHD) from the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD). We know that Petaluma intends to proceed with this designation. Thus, approval of the Consent Calendar's action item would have the CoC send the City of Petaluma a letter of support as they pursue PHD.

RECOMMENDED ACTION(S)

1. Approve signing Letter of Support for City of Petaluma Prohousing Designation

DISCUSSION

Relatively new as a part of the recurring HUD Continuum of Care competition, the CoC is scored on how the CoC has advocated for or otherwise worked to encourage the production of more affordable and market rate housing in the CoC's region. To this end and for the future period of October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023, there is an opportunity for the Continuum of Care Board to send letters of support to those jurisdictions who are pursuing the State of California's most proactive housing position – that being achieving a "prohousing designation" (PHD) from the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD). We know that the County of Sonoma, along with the City of Santa Rosa, the City of Rohnert Park, and the City of Healdsburg have proceeded with this designation, and this letter for the City of Petaluma will include the City of Petaluma going forward.

The Sonoma County Continuum of Care Board strongly supports the City of Petaluma's efforts to work towards lowering barriers to new affordable and market rate housing, including its efforts to align the City's land use and other policies and programs in ways that would achieve the State of California's "Prohousing" Designation ("PHD").

As your City and community is aware, PHD gives additional points in key grant funding (including affordable housing funds, infrastructure development funds, and transit funds) that allow jurisdictions to participate in various State grant application processes with higher point scores than jurisdictions that may not have secured PHD.

To secure the PHD, Petaluma will work to change its processes and programs such as the below:

- Adopting favorable Zoning and Land Use policies and programs, such as rezoning sufficient sites to accommodate 15% of more of regional housing needs by income category, permitting "missing middle" housing uses, and eliminating or reducing parking requirements or establishing parking maximums.
- Accelerating housing production timeframes, such as establishing ministerial approval processes for a variety of housing types, having a documented practice of streamlining housing development, and giving priority permit processing for Accessory Dwelling Units (AUDs) as well as multi-family affordable housing.
- Reducing construction and development costs, such as allowing for impact fee waivers or reductions, promoting innovating housing types that reduce costs, reducing transportationrelated infrastructure costs, and having pre-approved or prototype plans for missing middle housing types.
- Providing financial subsidies, such as local housing trust funds, ADU grants and low-interest loan programs, land donations via surplus land programs, and enacting enhanced infrastructure financing districts.

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The Continuum of Care Board is appreciative of the City's PHD goals and how that work will add to the region's supply of affordable and market rate housing. Please use the Sonoma County CoC's letter of support in any manner in which you see fit.

1 – Emergency Shelter Site Update – The emergency shelter site (ESS) established by the County of Sonoma's Department of Health Services (DHS) has provided shelter for about 75 people since it was set up effective March 23, 2023. The ESS allowed the County to house persons formerly residing on the Joe Rodota Trail (JRT) and then allow the JRT to be cleared of encampments, cleaned, and eventually (date TBD) reopened for public recreational access.

The site includes about 85 tents, and residents onsite receive supportive services, meals, showers, and other care as they are assisted into longer-term housing. Clients participate in "town hall" sessions that encourage local decisions made by clients, as well as limited programming such as gardening (pending) and arts.

Generally, DHS staff believes that the ESS has operated well over the past month, with minimal impacts on nearby residential areas and to the County employees who work nearby. Anecdotally, we have seen an uptick in unhoused residents in the area, as people come by to seek admission to the ESS or to visit friends or family in the ESS.

As of the date of this writing, the DHS/IMDT teams are considering very limited additional placements in the ESS from persons who were at the JRT or from persons residing in other local encampments who might be good fits for the ESS. Walk-in admissions are not allowed. Each person admitted must be referred to the ESS by the IMDT/HEART team members.

County teams and DEMA have appreciated the many expressions of support from area residents who have donated hygiene kits, blankets, hot and cold food, and more.

By the time of this agenda item, the County's communications teams will have held two neighborhood webinars about the ESS site, one on Monday evening, April 10, and one on Monday Evening, April 24th. The webinars are oriented towards neighborhood residents who

have communicated with the County as to interest in being kept apprised of ESS issues and operations.

2 – Elderberry Commons Update – the County of Sonoma's DHS team and staff from the Sonoma County Community Development Commission (CDC) have worked in recent weeks to secure long-term housing for each of the 21 persons who remained sheltered in the former Sebastopol Inn (now known as Elderberry Commons). As of the date of this writing, about 12 persons remain with a housing need, and several of these await their move-in dates at a local apartment complex in Santa Rosa. Many sheltered persons were eligible for and received either Mainstream housing vouchers or vouchers under the updated Homeless Preference within the Sonoma County Housing Authority.

The County extended the occupancy period of Elderberry Commons from April 14th through May 1 to allow for sheltered occupants to not have to move twice as they await their apartment move-in dates. This helped several individuals, but not all – some persons will indeed have to move twice as May 1st arrives and the time comes for Elderberry Commons to enter its construction phase.

The reason for the move-out for Elderberry is to transition it from COVID-19-related interim or transitional housing into Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH). With PSH, residents at Elderberry will have a lease and live in a typical apartment setting, though with supportive services to assist them. A Board of Supervisors agenda item to enterinto contracts with expected service providers and new housing owners is anticipated in mid-May, 2023.

3 – Ending Homelessness & Provider Workshop - On Tuesday, April 4th, the DHS / Homelessness Services team met with many Sonoma County service providers at the first of hopefully several ongoing sessions where we solve problems together and help implement the Continuum of Care's 2023-2027 strategic plan. About 18 representatives of the service provider community attended, along with 13 DHS staff members from Homelessness Services.

Our goal – collectively – is to approach issues and problems via shared values and communications agreements (yet to be finalized). Generally, the outcome of the meeting on April 4 was positive, but it's likely that all members who participated are interested in "what's next" and how we can start to better address issues and problems as "one coordinated system" that treats all parties with transparency, fairness, equity, and collaboration.

DHS staff hopes that this starting point leads to at least a quarterly in-person session for 2-3 hours whereby the group as a whole continues to build its relationships, has shared training experiences, and collaboratively addresses areas where the Sonoma County system of care as a whole needs to come together on the best approaches.

4 – April 2023 Update on Regional Homelessness Activities – This update is presented to the CoC Board as a draft following a conversation with Board member Una Glass, who mentioned

to me (Dave K, and I will paraphrase here): "I think the Board should be made more aware of the different things going on in Sonoma County about homelessness (and on a regular basis)."

This update is also to get a sense of whether this type of information (and the way it is presented) is helpful or useful. I further note that it is incomplete - in preparing this version over a couple of brief days, I was unable to check in with all parties (especially folks from the City of Santa Rosa or Catholic Charities) by the time I needed to go to print for the agenda.

SUMMARY

In this item, staff will present funding recommendations for Measure O. Non-conflicted CoC Board members are requested to provide feedback and consultations on Measure O funding recommendations prior to approval of funding recommendations by the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors.

RECOMMENDED ACTION(S)

1. Provide feedback and consultation on recommendations for Measure O funding prior to Board of Supervisors approval of Measure O funding for FY 23-24.

DISCUSSION

A Notice of Funds Availability (NOFA) for \$3 million in funding for Measure O was released by the Homelessness Services Division with the Department of Health Services on February 1, 2023 with responses due by Friday, March 17, 2023. Eligible applicants included community based organizations (CBOs), County departments, cities, cities in partnership with CBOs, or cities in partnership with the County.

Priority projects, all of which must be housing focused, included existing projects that are well into developmental stages or new projects. Priorities include:

- Shared housing or Master Lease Programs
- Non-Congregate Shelter programs
- 24/7 Safe Parking Programs
- Permanent Supportive Housing Programs
- Other concepts not stated but which are housing focused interventions that lead individuals experiencing homelessness to securing permanent housing

A total of 12 applications were received and all applications met threshold eligibility for funding. Funding requests totaled \$8,164,398 for the \$3 million in available funding.

Staff from the Homelessness Services Division and Health Policy Planning and Equity units within the Department of Health Services reviewed applications and scored each application based on the review metrics outlined in the Measure O NOFA. These metrics included:

- Overall Proposal and Program Quality (30 points)
- Type of Proposal/Program and if existing or in development stage (10 points)
- Program's Operation Plan, including an achievable budget and hosing focus (30 points)
- Adherence to the NOFA (10 points)
- Geographical Need (20 points)

Staff recommend the following projects for consultation with the CoC Board based on a thorough review of all applications and considerations of projects that have received similar or proposed funding in other current or previous NOFAs released. After consultation with the CoC Board, the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors will approve funding recommendations.

2. Recommendations for Measure O Funding

In reviewing projects, staff noted that applicants proposed a mix of single year or multi-year projects. More projects could be funded on an initial basis by adhering to one year project funding while, in contrast, another approach would be to fully fund the top scoring projects regardless of whether projects were one year or multiple years.

<u>Staff Recommendations – Prioritize One Year Contracts</u>

Staff recommends prioritizing funding for one year to ensure consistency across the system. The one exception is funding the City of Sonoma's request for a single staff position for By Names List and Outreach work for two years to ensure continuity and allow for time for hiring. This is accomplished by slightly reducing SHARE Sonoma County's request as it has funds available from other sources. Assuming additional Measure O dollars are available in FY 24-25, projects could be renewed for a second year and projects serving only one year would sunset.
