


NEXT STEPS

For The Comprehensive Multi-agency Juvenile Justice Plan





Developing the CMJJ Plan has been a primary function of the Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council (JJCC) since its form ation in 1996

Per Welfare and Institutions Code (WIC) §749.22, each county shall be required to establish a multiagency juvenile justice coordinating council that shall develop and implement a continuum of county-based responses to juvenile crime.



In 2020, the JJCC adopted goals following a system-wide assessment driven by the Improving Outcomes for Youth (IO Youth) Initiative


The CMJJ Plan will:

- identify the resources and strategies for providing an effective continuum of responses for the prevention, intervention, supervision, services (suppression), and detention (incapacitation) of male and female juvenile offenders
- develop and implement regional out-of-home placement options for youths who are persons described in WIC §602



GOAL AREAS

- Diversion
- Detention Decision Making and Alternatives to Detention
- Detention Services
- Juvenile Equity and Training
- Probation Supervision, Family Engagement and Case Planning
- Camp [Removed in 2021 due to Camp unoccupancy]
- Quality Assurance and Data Collection






We have made a lot of progress. However, some priorities have shifted due to:

- Passage of Senate Bill (SB) 823 which realigned youth from the Division of Juvenile Justice (DJJ)
- The pandemic
- A general decline in referrals

The 2020-2022 CMJJ Plan has seen extensive progress



Completed/Continuous	In Progress	Not Started
Created new policies and eligibility criteria for pre-file diversion based on the PACT	Enhance diversion partnerships with law enforcement, HSD, schools	Map funding streams to leverage community resources
Implemented a revised Detention Risk Assessment Instrument (DRAI) & policy, including training and data collection	Use the graduated response matrix to fidelity	One-stop assessment center
Implemented the Child-Family Team Meetings model at all points in continuum	Paid, bilingual position to navigate families through Probation process	Limit detention thru non- secure residential or community based alternatives
Expansion of CBO partnerships for reentry	Finalize DRAI QA for ongoing data collection & analysis	Mandatory family finding/kinship placement; no detention



With a new JJCC, we have a lot of options:

- Continue work on the existing goals
- Review, prioritize, and remove goals that no longer are feasible
- Do a whole new assessment
- A hybrid make a short list of priorities and do an assessment within that those goals, as needed




After this meeting, a survey will be sent to determine:

- New ideas




The JJCC subcommittee will:
